### Welcome First Fruits Of New Marine Policy.

The first fruits of the new marine policy of the Dominion Government in docking the Canadian Skirmisher here is welcomed by the people of Prince Rupert. While the vessel will not be here very long, a good deal of money will be spent and the port will benefit from the work done and the advertising the place will get.

Capt. Hilton explains to the Daily News that a vessel loses very little time in calling here en route from Vancouver to the Orient or returning. This indicates clearly that it would be a distinct advantage to call here to pick up or deliver cargo. It is noticeable that Canadian vessels call at any ports in Australasia at which business may be offering, even if the amount of cargo is not very large. Why a different policy for this country should be adopted is not evident except on the assumption that undue influence has been used to check the business of this port for fear it may eat into the business of some other port.

We welcome Capt. Hilton and his fine ship on behalf of the city. We hope he will pay many visits to this port and that not always for docking purposes.




