## COOKING NEWS SAY CRITICS

Charge Made That Newspapers Deliberately Conceal Facts and Mislead Readers.

The Manitoba Free Press says editorially: "Some eighteen month ago one of the United States 'advanced' weekly journals issued a very elaborate forty-two page special supplement, for the interesting purpose of showing that news papers cooked the news, concealed facts and misled their readers. The issue taken was the Russian revolution, and the newspaper which was subjected to examination was the New York Times. The inquirers said in their conclusions that the news about Russia had not been accurate, and it had not been accurate because the reporters who gathered the news and the newspaper editors who edited it were hostile to Soviet Russia. The straight charge is made:

### Twisted News.

"The Russian policy of the editors of the Times profoundly and easily influenced their news columns. The office handling of the news, both as to emphasis and captions, was unmistakably controlled by other than a professional standard."

The impression left on the reader by the investigators of how the Times handled its news was that the editors of the Times had twisted the news to do as much harm to the Bolsheviks and radicals as they could because they were personally opposed to Bolshevism and radicalism. The inquiry made out that the radicals, so far as getting themselves reported in the newspapers were victims of reactionary and unfair newspaper proprietors. It was one more slam, and quite an elaborate slam too, at the capitalist "press." It must have cost its authors quite a lot of work and trouble.

### Making Catpaws.

And now comes another gentleman, a Lewis Harper, who claims to be a practical newspaper editor, with the dogmatic assertion that the radicals are making catpaws of the "capitalist press," and are using it successfully in the spread of radical propaganda. And Mr. Harper's point is that "most of this subtle communist infiltration of the news is the result of conscious 'bearing from within' by men and women occupying strategic positions where news originates or is distributed."

In other words the news is being deliberately and consciously twisted and doctored to do as much harm to "capitalism" as possible and as much good as possible to the cause of the radicals and the communists.

It is an interesting position. One set of gentlemen read the newspapers and find proof that the editors are twisting the news against radicalism. Another gentleman comes along and affirms, apparently on evidence well seen how I can get out of that the editors are twisting it."—Weekly Telegraph.

## NEWFOUNDLAND MAY JOIN WITH THIS DOMINION

**Arguments For and Against Given in Papers Published on The Island.**

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 13.—The question of union of Newfoundland with Canada has been receiving some attention in the Ancient Colony, according to newspapers of St. John's received here.

One writer affirms that it is reasonable to suppose that the Canadian Government which has acquired railways from the Atlantic to the Pacific would, to assure the entry of Newfoundland into the Confederation, take over the Reid railway of Newfoundland and convert it into a broad gauge. Thus, by one stroke the writer suggests, Newfoundland would be relieved of payment of the subsidy of \$1,500,000 recently granted the Reid railway, and secure a railway service compared with which the present service is not worth mentioning.

Another writer recognizes that Canada is destined to become an important nation but only by Newfoundland becoming part thereof, because "the island's geographical position is the key to Canada's future." Canadian statesmen are astute enough to realize this, he thinks, and will therefore be prepared to offer terms of union which it would be wise for Newfoundland to accept informally.

### For the Union.

The investigators of the New York Times admit that the Times is one of the great newspapers of the world, and they are so naive and innocent as to affirm that the editors of this great newspaper cook its news to suit their own personal ends. Which is equivalent to saying of a man that he has a splendid moral character, but that he tells lies with great skill seven days a week.

Mr. Harper says that newspaper proprietors cook the news in order to increase their circulation, and she is naive and innocent enough to think that the public will patronize a newspaper whose news is invariably wrong or consistently biased.

Of course, when all the critics, radical, reactionary and the rest come out and tell the world that the newspapers are unfair and news distorters, the common people have a chance to get at the truth, namely, that the newspaper has always been the favorite target for cranks to shoot at, and that considering extraordinary complex nature of gathering, sifting, editing and printing news the percentage of error in the average issue of a newspaper would compare very favorably with the average percentage of error in any other line of human endeavor that could be named.

Chain Stores Make Gains During the Year 1921.

It's easier than Reno.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—(Canadian Press)—A resume of trade conditions in the United States during 1921 which has just been compiled here shows that for the most part the year was one of decreased business for the mail order houses and increased business for the chain store concerns. The falling off in the mail order business was largely due to conditions in the agricultural sections of the country. The tremendous decline in the prices of farm products reduced the purchasing power of the farming community.
