HOUSE WHERE HISTORY MADE

Lloyd George's Residence, 10 Downing Street, Most Famous Private House in Britain.

No. 10, Downing Street, London, is the most famous private house in the world.

It is the residence of Mr. Lloyd George and has been the home of Prime Ministers for the past two hundred years. Downing Street is a little blind alley off Whitehall. Two steps lead up to No. 10, which has a plain oak door with a wrought iron knock-er.

A fine fireplace is a feature of the carpeted hall which leads to the waiting room. This room has a mahogany table and many capacious armchairs, and writing materials of every description for the use of visitors. A quaint little garden may be seen from the window.

The Cabinet Room. The most interesting room, where all important meetings are held, is the Cabinet room. It is in this room that the Cabinet held its midnight sitting on August 3rd, 1914, to decide whether there should be war with Germany. Mr. Lloyd George has stated that this was the most dramatic moment of his life.

This room is really a library. It is small and narrow, with a high ceiling, and at the entrance are four white pillars.

The first floor is given over to council rooms and the offices of the Prime Minister's secretaries. The second floor comprises the private residence of the Premier and his family. This is like a large flat with all the usual appointments.

Unofficial Breakfast. The Premier breakfasts at 8:30 and usually entertains a guest. The famous Downing Street unofficial breakfast conferences have decided many important questions.

The reception room is a splendid apartment. There is an inner room which is the Prime Minister's sanctum, and which used to be Gladstone's favorite breakfast room.

For all its power and authority No. 10 is a simple and unassuming house. Most of those who knock are admitted. The residence of the Premier is as accessible as any house in London.

Built in 1674.

Downing Street was built in 1674 by Sir George Downing, a supporter of Cromwell. He received a grant of the property in Whitehall, later known as Downing Street, and built the row of houses there. He occupied No. 10 himself.

After Downing's death the house passed to the Government and has since been used as an official residence.
