OTTAWA, May 17 .- The Opposition blocked the passage of +++++++++++ the naval estimates last night following announcement by the government that the naval strength to be maintained would comprise the destroyers Patrician and Patriot and four trawlers evenv divided between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts to be used as training ships for a volunteer navy on a part time basis.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Conservative opposition, said that the proposal fell short of Canada's moral obligation as an integral part of the British Empire. He declared that Canada

shiuld bear her share of the burden of defence or retire from the Empire. The Canadian parliament had consented to accept and maintain Britain's gift ships, but now the Liberal government proposed to repudiate the agreement, scrap the ships and waste seventeen cents per capita annually on a navy which would not produce one finished fighting

Premier's Reply

Premier W. L. Mackenzie King said that the government was carrying out the Laurier naval policy for a volunteer navy available for the British Admiralty in case of emergency. The late government had accepted ships which would have been scrapped by Britain herself now, but which would cost Canada \$2,500,000 annually to maintain. The Premier asked that the estimates be considered at once.
