SENSATIONAL DIVORCE CASE NEARING END

Detective Claims He Paid \$15,000 for Mrs. Stillman's Letters to Indian.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., May 17.—Testimony that letters Mrs. Anne U. Stillman wrote to Fred Beauvais had been purchased last week from Fred Beauvais for \$15,000 by representatives of James A. Stillman was given last week at the trial of the divorce suit of the millionaire New Yorker against his wife.

Evidence in the sensational case came to a close when a detective hired by Stillman testified that he paid \$15,000 in cash to Beauvais, an Indian guide named as co-respondent for four letters alleged to have been written to the Indian by Mrs. Stillman.

Beauvais Denies.

MONTREAL, May 17.—Fred Beauvais, the Indian guide named as co-respondent in the Stillman divorce case, has denied specifically that he had ever sold letters from Mrs. Stillman to Stillman's lawyers, as charged in testimony yesterday at Poughkeepsie during the divorce trial. Beauvais declared Mrs. Stillman an "absolutely pure and innocent woman."

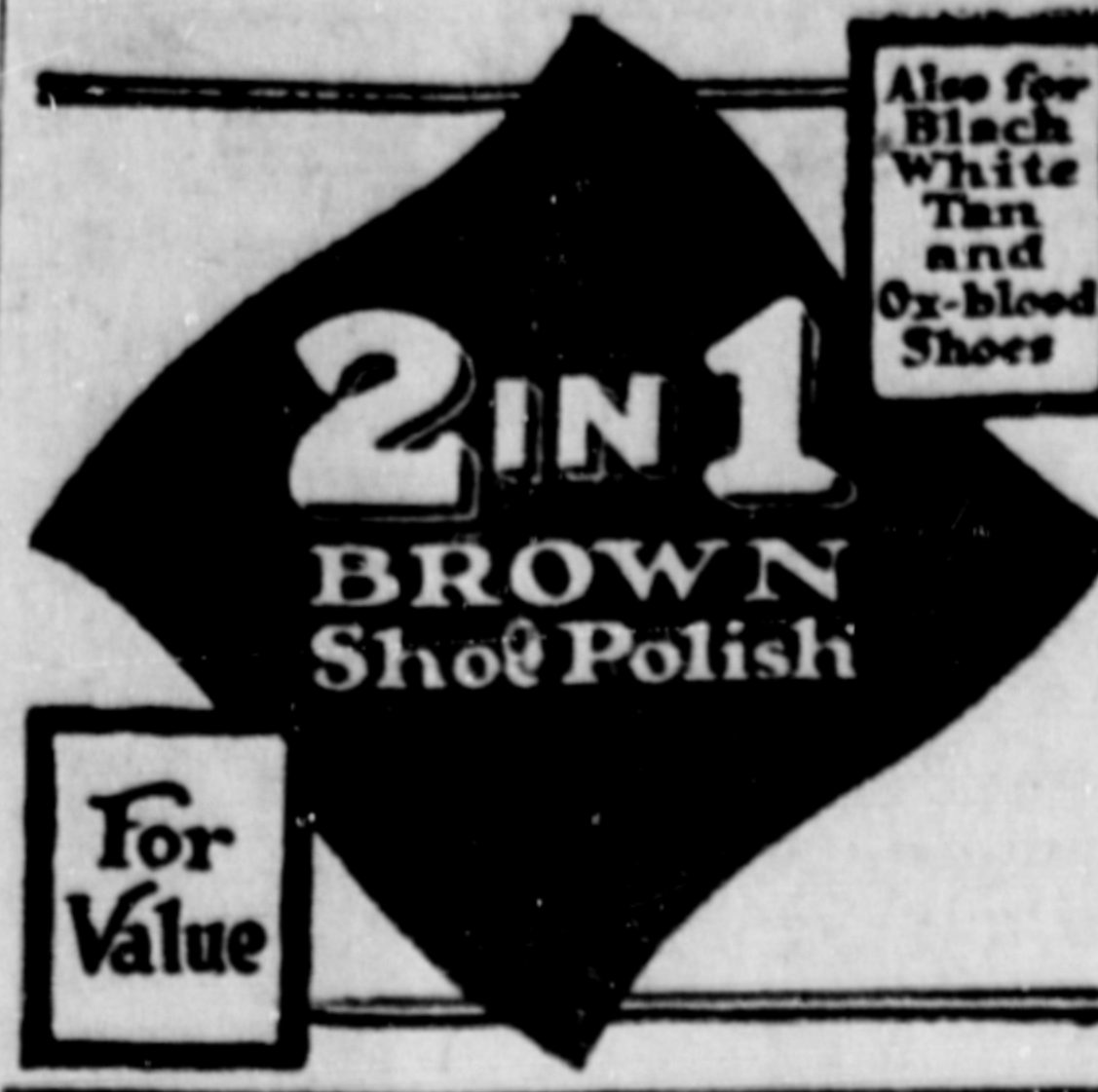

LOCAL DENTIST GETS FIRST X-RAY MACHINE

Dr. A. H. Bayne Installs Up-to-Date Apparatus at His Office.

One of the very latest types of X-ray machines has made its appearance in the city—one that is not only equipped for the taking of X-ray pictures of any part of the body but is specially adapted for dental work.

This machine has been installed by Dr. A. H. Bayne, the local dentist. It can be instantly put into operation, and by means of the fluoroscope, which is similar to the old fashioned stereopticon lens, any part of the body can be studied and foreign bodies immediately recognized. The machine is manufactured by Kelley-Koett of Covington, New Jersey, and was shipped to the city direct from the factory through the agents in Vancouver. It is equipped with a Collidge tube of the radiator type and with the latest safety devices which as well is perfectly safe in operation both for the operator as well as the patient. No wires are exposed at any point, and a cut-out device, which instantaneously shuts off all power if one should touch any portion of the machine, makes it impossible for accidents to happen. Another very interesting attachment is the timer which allows the operator when making an exposure, to set the exposure to a fraction of a second. This timer shuts off all current and permits the operator to focus all his attention on the taking of the X-ray photograph. The entire machine is built on the roller bearing principle, and with one hand can be moved to any part of the room and the light thrown to any angle desired. With the use of this machine the mouth may be thoroughly examined and the dentist is enabled to see what is under the gum as well as above.

This is the only X-ray machine specially equipped for dental work in Northern B. C. and is as modern as any in the province.

FOUND BABE'S BODY ON BANK OF RIVER

MONTREAL, May 17.—Wrapped in a newspaper parcel, the body of a baby boy was found a few feet from the edge of the St. Lawrence River at Laprairie on Saturday afternoon.

Coroner McMahon was notified of the discovery and ordered the body to be brought to Montreal. An autopsy performed by Dr. D. D. MacTaggart, medical expert of the Coroner's Court, proved that the child had lived after birth. Its death was due to neglect. An inquest will be held next Monday.

Chief of Provincial Detective Lorrain was informed of the case and an operative will investigate it in the meantime.

RULE OF THE ROAD TO BE CHANGED IN NOVA SCOTIA

HALIFAX, N.S., May 17.—During the session of the Nova Scotia legislature just closed, an act was adopted providing that after January 1, 1923, all traffic on the highways and streets of the province should drive to the right. By an act adopted by the New Brunswick legislature the change from the present practice of driving to the left will take place in that province at the same time.

With the abandonment of the drive to the left rule in the Maritimes, one more old world custom will disappear from this continent, a custom laid down from the days when the horsemen rode around in tin garments and kept fellow wayfarers on their right so as to be better able to guard against surprises.
