MUCH TIME LOST IN GREAT BRITAIN FROM LABOR DISPUTES

Situation of Employment Gradually Improving, However, Although Wages Lower.

LONDON, May 17.—It is estimated that 3,500,000 working days were lost in Great Britain in March owing to labor disputes involving 280,000 workers. The principal disputes being in the engineering and shipbuilding industries.

Unemployment in March, though still bad, showed a further slight improvement despite the adverse effect of the engineering dispute, says the Labor Gazette, which publishes the estimate above.

Among industries showing improvement were iron, mining, pig iron manufacture, the building trades, the cotton and wool textile industries and the clothing trades.

Changes in rates of wages reported as having taken effect in March resulted in a reduction of over £223,000 in the weekly full time wage of about 1,350,000 workers and an increase of £800 weekly in the wages of about 70,000 others.

Coal miners in Northumberland, Yorkshire, North Staffordshire, north Wales and Scotland sustained reductions varying from under two per cent to over eight per cent, the paper states.

Sport Chat

Last week in the Prince George City Hall the statutory meeting of the Prince George Rink Ltd., was held. The report of the actions of the provisional directors was read, and approved by the meeting, following which the election of directors was held. The following were elected directors: Henry Wilson, Fred D. Taylor, R. W. Alward, Standley George, A. McR. Young and J. B. Daniell. The company plans to proceed with the rink project this year and to have a good skating rink on its excellent location next winter.

The Stewart Tennis Club has elected the following officers for the year: Mrs. W. J. Crawford, president; J. W. Wilson, secretary-treasurer; Committee: Mrs. H. P. Gibson, Mrs. W. Cameron, Mrs. A. McLeod. It has been decided to undertake this year extensive repairs to the court and grounds, including a new club house.

Construction of a new stadium for the New York American League Club, a short distance from its present "home" at the Polo grounds, was begun last week. If the Yankees win the American League championship this year, the stadium may be occupied for the world series. The park furthermore may be used for football games this fall if it is completed in time.

The eventual capacity of the stadium, which will have a three-deck stand surrounding the playing field, will be 85,000—greater than that of any ball park ever built. To begin with, however, temporary wooden bleachers will be used to supplement the concrete grandstand, and will be retained until the attendance warrants completion of the plant. This may require several years.

The park will be in the shape of a horseshoe, similar to the Polo grounds, extending 700 feet along 157th street and 700 feet down. The distance from the batter's box to the center field will be 470 feet, and from the box to right and left fields, 257 feet, making it more difficult than most parks in which to hit home runs.

AUSTRALIA'S WHITE POLICY IS FAVORED IN GREAT BRITAIN

MELBOURNE, May 17.—The Imperial British government, as a matter of Empire concern, is favorably inclined toward Australia's "White Australia" policy, reports Sir James Connolly, Agent General for West Australia in London.

Sir James states that the policy would help close the back door to the Australian continent, and especially to the unpeopled semi-tropical territories of Northern Australia.

It is possible, Sir James said that the Imperial government would aid in the scheme of building railways and roads and equipping 2000 farms in the territory for occupation by emigrants from British lands.

Roses here are in full bloom and the strawberries are being picked. Naturally the berries are better served here than they are when they reach British Columbia, but they are not as luscious as those grown at Gordon Head or Terrace.

Only Impressions. The opinions I am giving here are the result of rapid glances from the car, except for the places where we stopped and met a good many people. A short account of a Trip to California in a Ford Flivver By H. F. Pullen

OVERCOATS IN CALIFORNIA.

VENTURIA, Cal.—We are about three or four hours drive from Los Angeles. We should have made it today but we had two punctures and a long detour which delayed us a good deal and on arrival here about five o'clock it was blowing a gale and commencing to rain. All day it has been so cold that our heavy overcoats were just comfortable. Last night when we camped we made our bed with four blankets and a heavy eider-down comforter and then the two overcoat on our feet were acceptable. It is colder here today than it was in Victoria when we started and the last few days have been so windy that Victoria seems calm after it.

Make the comparisons with Victoria because Prince Rupert is different. The season there is milder and the winds are not steady and cold like those that come up the straits to Victoria. Before I left Prince Rupert, Jack McLeod strongly advised me to take my heavy coat with me and his advice was good. Anyone visiting here at this time of year should do the same. I find that many of the residents here have heavy coats. We had had weather so hot that it was almost stifling and other weather that has been so cold as to be uncomfortable.

Kept in by Weather.

Though we are staying at a hotel because of the bad weather. We strolled to the beach just before dark and watched the big rollers from the Pacific break on the shore. The sky looked dark and lowering and the roar of the waves added to the effect. Today we have driven through all kinds of country. There have been stretches of fruit orchards, cattle ranches, wild lands, rice and alfalfa lands and mixed farming country. We saw our first lemon orchard with the ripe and ripening lemons hanging on the trees. Many of the orchards are not fenced but nobody interferes. As a rule the residents are a good class of people and the towns are prosperous.

All the places have Spanish names. This morning we passed through the oil field of Santa Barbara and this afternoon we saw the old wells near Santa Barbara which have been sunk along with some of them in the sea. There are also oil wells close to the town, which are giving an impetus to business. It is pleasant to be in the country after spending two days in San Francisco. In the big sport it is a question of going

like blazes all the time and keeping your eyes open. In the country it is rather different. Tomorrow we hope to be in Los Angeles or at least in Hollywood. There we expect to find things moving fast.

The Number Plate.

Our number plate is interesting to a lot of people and we are often asked about British Columbia. Some do not know of Prince Rupert, while others have heard of it. There is, however, a friendly feeling everywhere. We find people treat us well and it is not often we feel we are overcharged on account of being strangers.

Some of the California towns are expensive. Residents of Palo Alto say it is more expensive living there than in British Columbia. Coal is \$26.50 a ton and wood is \$18.50 a cord. The public utility charges for a small family in a six-roomed house including gas for one month \$17. The lady pays \$55 a month for the cottage and she says she inquired about purchasing a six-roomed concrete bungalow and they asked \$8,000 for it.

Shoeshines cost 15c and hair cuts vary from 50c to 75c. Some fruit is cheap and other fruit costs just as much as in British Columbia.
