



Zam-Buk**BRINGING UP FATHER****GIVES SKETCH OF FRED STORK**

Ottawa Conservative Paper Says Local Member Very Active and Popular.

Under a display heading "The People in Parliament" the Ottawa Journal, Conservative, has an interesting sketch of the life and activities of Fred Stork, member for Skeena. It says:

"What's in a name?" Fred Stork, Liberal member for Skeena, might well quote after Shakespeare. For one thing, the uncommonness of his name and that of his riding is one to be remembered. Around the corridors of Parliament and in political circles, the names have sort of become inseparably associated and he is usually spoken of as "Stork of Skeena." And back in 1904, when Mr. Stork made his entry into public life as the first Mayor of Fernie, B. C., following the incorporation of that town, his opponent for the mayoralty was a man by the name of Quail. Now Mr. Stork comes to Parliament after taking the measure of another man with an rather unusual name, Col. Cy. Peek, ex-M.P., of Victoria Cross Island.

Four Square.
Mr. Stork cannot lay claim to being a native son of British Columbia, but it would be difficult to find a man who stands as "four square" as he does when the interests of his native province are at stake. A man of Mr. Stork's stamp was bound to command himself to the attention and confidence of his fellow-citizens and find his way to Parliament. His splendid civic record as Mayor of Fernie, and later of Prince Rupert left its impress on the public mind and was not forgotten when the Liberals of Skeena brought him in the field last December.

Going to British Columbia in 1898, Mr. Stork settled in Fernie, opened a general hardware store, took a leading part in the affairs of the then village, and became Fernie's first mayor on its incorporation as a town in 1904. He was also a member of the Fernie Town Council in 1907. The following year, Mr. Stork disposed of his interests in Fernie and removed to Prince Rupert, where he started into business again as a hardware merchant. When Prince Rupert was raised to the status of a city in 1910, Mr. Stork again had the honor of being the first mayor. His record in this respect is undoubtedly unique in Canadian municipal history.

Introduced Single Tax.
It was during Mr. Stork's regime as Mayor of Prince Rupert that big things were done in a civic sense. The single tax, a method of taxation much discussed and criticized in recent years, was introduced and has worked out satisfactorily. The city also inaugurated its own telephone, water and electric lighting systems, and close on to a half million dollars were spent in grading the streets. Prince Rupert is 436 miles nearer the Orient than any Pacific port, has a population of about 8,000 people and property assessment of \$17,000,000. The city is notable for many things. It is the greatest fishing port on the Pacific coast, has the largest cold storage plant on the coast, a magnificent harbor ranking third among the world's harbors, and is also the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

Mr. Stork has been one of Prince Rupert's "live wires" since he settled there in 1908. In addition to his interest in

civic affairs, he has taken an active part in politics, both provincial and federal, and is a past president of the Prince Rupert Liberal Association. He was also the first chairman of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade, and a member and the sergeant-at-arms of the Prince Rupert Club. Mr. Stork is unequivocally opposed to Oriental immigration into Canada, and he gave an earnest of his stand in this regard during his tenure of office as mayor of Prince Rupert. He had a bylaw passed making the granting of applications of liquor licenses for hotels conditional on the non-employment of Oriental labor in the hotels.

The riding which Mr. Stork represents in Parliament was established under the Redistribution Act of 1914. Mr. Stork was the Liberal candidate of Skeena at the general elections of 1917, and it looked for a time as if he had defeated Col. Cy. Peek, V.C., the Unionist Government nominee. The civil vote gave a majority of 695 votes, but this majority was transformed into a majority of 524 for Col. Peek after the military votes had been added to the civil votes.

Election Notable Win.
In the last elections, Mr. Stork was more successful than his former victorious opponent in unravelling the electoral skein in Skeena. Mr. Stork's majority was raised to the status of a city in 1910, Mr. Stork again had the honor of being the first mayor. His record in this respect is undoubtedly unique in Canadian municipal history.

Mr. Stork was married in 1898 to Miss Emily Parkinson, whose father, John Parkinson, a native of Lancashire, had settled in Brantford, Mr. and Mrs. Stork have three children, one son and two daughters. Douglas Stork, a young man of 24, the eldest child is the secretary-treasurer of the Stork Hardware Company, of Prince Rupert.

Mr. Stork was one of the first members to reach Ottawa for the session. Since his arrival, he has been giving particular attention to matters pertaining to British Columbia. Mr. Stork is very popular among his fellow-parliamentarians, and it is said that his proficiency as an Al story-teller has something to do with the popularity he enjoys.

BOY SCOUTS WANT GRANT

City Council Is Asked for \$400 Matter Referred to Finance Committee.

The Boy Scouts of Prince Rupert have asked the city council for a grant of \$400 in support of the movement. A letter-making this request was received at last night's meeting and a delegation comprising George Rorie, president of the Boy Scouts, Canon G. A. Rix and R. V. G. Lepine was on hand to press the claim. The scouts have also asked the mayor and aldermen to be patrons of a concert which they are to stage on April 27. The matter of the grant has been referred to the Finance Committee for report.

Purpose of Organization.
Speaking to the request, Mr. Rorie said that the Boy Scouts had been organized in the city for the purpose of looking after the welfare of the boys at an age when their characters were being moulded. There were already about 100 boys enrolled between the ages of 7 and 16. He considered that it was part of the city work and a grant of \$400 was not too much to ask. There was no doubt that the money would be well laid out in the training given to the boys in character for their future manhood.

Canon Rix spoke at length emphasizing that the movement was neither religious or militaristic. Anti-militarism was one of the basic principles of the organization. It was undenominational although a high code of morals was demanded. There were two centres in the city already at the Presbyterians and Anglican Churches at which boys of all denominations were assembling. R. V. G. Lepine concurred in the remark of Mr. Rorie and Canon Rix.

Mayor's Support.
Mayor Rochester said he was satisfied that the object was worthy and the movement was badly needed. The benefits derived from the training would go down in the future life of the boys. He was sure the Finance Committee would give the request every consideration and would even strain a point.

On motion of Ald. Kerr, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, the matter was referred to the Finance Committee.
