GENOA, April 11.—A clash which might have shipwrecked the financial conference on its first day was averted today by the firmness and tact of Lloyd George and Premier Facta of Italy, who is chairman.

George Tchitcherin, head of the Russian delegation, said Russia accepted the terms set forth at Cannes governing partici- offects of the proprietor are a pation in the conference, but Russia would go further and welweather the storm of adversity, come any steps possible leading to disarmament.

M. Barthou, head of the French delegation, heatedly denied that Tchitcherin had a right to bring up disarmament, which was not on the agenda of the conference, and would be opposed as a topic for this conference by France to the bitter end.

Lloyd George asked the Russian to keep to the agenda and complete the work the conference had met to do before embarking on other tasks. He urged that if any problems were added to the discussion the conference might be shipwrecked and the peace of
