**STORK GIVES LECTURE
ON VISIT TO POMPEII
AT ROTARY LUNCHEON**

Tells of Restoration of Ancient City That Was Buried Beneath 25 feet of Volcanic Ash.

Fred Stork, M. P., gave a most interesting address yesterday to the members of the Rotary Club, his subject being "A Visit to Pompeii." In opening he said they were all so full of the appointment of Mr. Dawson to the Board of Directors of the Canadian National Railways that he found it difficult to speak on so tame a subject as that of Pompeii. Central B. C. was to be congratulated on the appointment.

It was some years ago that he visited the ancient city that had been buried by ashes from the volcano Vesuvius. He had gone there from Paris and had found it extreme fascinating. The old ruins were like a treasure-house of ancient things.

At the time of the eruption, there had been 25,000 people within the walls and it had suddenly been covered with 25 feet of ashes. The men and women had been instantly killed by the poisonous gases and the result was that everything was found as it was two thousand years ago. Later a man digging a well had found part of the ruins and excavation had resulted in the buildings being unearthed almost as perfect as they were before the ash storm fell. The houses and streets and the people and furniture and pictures were all there. There were ruins in the pavements made by the chariots. Plaster casts of the people had been taken and there were gladiators and all the paraphernalia of sports.

Mr. Stork went into some detail in his description of the place and the lecture was much enjoyed.


