CANNES, France, Jan. 4 .- To save Europe from complete economic disintegration and keep the Entente from falling apart are the big tasks which are being undertaken here by Premier; Lloyd George of Great Britain and Premier Briand of France. The opening of their private conversations began today soon after the arrival of Premier Briand from Paris.

Premier Lloyd George intends on Friday to meet the ported cancellation of the ship-Supreme Conneil of the Allies, which convenes on that day. Experts regard as encouraging the progress which has been made by the British project for organization to deal with credits, exchange and possibly currency.

Premier Briand recently declared that the best solution of the European question would be through an Anglo-French alliance.


