RUSSIA IS DOING ILLICIT TRADING WITH HER NEIGHBORS

Buying From Poland with Old Gold Coins and Diamonds.

WARSAW, April 18.—Poland and Soviet Russia are doing some trading despite their difficulty in arranging a trade convention.

For months Poland has been sending into Russia, by wagon and by packs on horseback great amounts of cloth and some food supplies, most of the business being carried on at night away from the beaten path where either Soviet guards or Polish soldiers are on watch.

In return the smugglers have been receiving some of the old Russian gold rubles, which peasants had buried as well as hides, furs and in some instances diamonds.

Dress material and bright colored shawls which the Russian peasant women wear over their heads on Sunday when they go to church are in greater demand than at any time since Russia's troubles began and, according to travelers, bring a fancy price once these goods are landed on the other side.

A Soviet Russian trade commission has been in Warsaw some time arranging purchases from the Poles and it was announced recently that the first consignment of goods purchased officially by the Soviets would leave soon for Moscow.

This consignment is made up chiefly of clothing materials manufactured in Lodz. The goods will be insured against theft, the insurance company furnishing armed guards to convey the freight cars all the way from Warsaw to the Soviet capital.

Export Caviar.

Despite the famine in Russia the government has permitted caviar to be sent out of the country because of the high price it brings. There has been but

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Participation in pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each holding necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to the value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre.

Where pre-emptor in occupation less than 2 years and has made no portentious improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause incapable of responding to the improvement and transfer his claim.

Records, without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of at least 5 acres are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his pre-emption, and improvements made and residence maintained on Crown Grant land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 400 acres may be used by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on outer land not exceeding 100 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural gas agreements to include existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Release of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The object of this Act is enlarged to include all persons holding or applying with His Majesty's Forces. The same within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on moneys to include purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents acquired during or in consequence of the great war, until March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, or failed to fulfill conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim holdover of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1922.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

In December last Russia exported to foreign countries through Latvia alone more than 150,000 pounds of caviar, some of which was sent to the United States. Other exports included hemp, flax, leaf tobacco, furs, unfanned hides, kerosene and bristles.

ODESSA PEOPLE ARE SHORT GOOD CLOTHES

ODESSA, April 18.—Spring fashions do not bother the people of Odessa. They have no new fashion journals nor cloth with which to make new dresses. Women sometimes have a hat and a few yards of rough cloth to clothe themselves.

Underclothing in an unknown quantity. So are stockings for the unlucky. Women who have cloaks or furs wear them in day time and at night leave them home. If they did not they would be robbed in the darkened streets.

Here we are all dressed alike and more or less in rags, and so long as we can get food enough perhaps it is best that we stay in Russia."

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS MANITOBA ARE COSTLY

Over Eight Million Dollars Will Have Been Expended When Finished.

WINNIPEG, Apr. 13.—The total cost of the new parliament buildings and grounds, including interest charges, when completed will be \$8,107,036, according to information given the legislature today by Hon. C. D. McPherson, minister of public works. The amount required to complete the buildings and grounds is \$250,000.

The return tabled in the legislature shows the total cost of the parliament buildings site and construction when the present government came into office was \$1,994,199. The total cost of construction charges paid by the present government so far has totalled \$4,614,614. The total cost of presenting Thomas Kelly, not including the case before the privy council, has already amounted to \$24,921.

WINNIPEG, April 18.—Liberals are preparing for the election which is to be held some time during the coming summer. A convention has been called to meet here on April 25 at which plans will be laid for contesting every constituency in the province.

The Progressives under their official organization are also preparing for a big campaign. There is a remnant of Conservatives but it is not thought they will figure largely in the election. Labor will be active in this city and other centres of population.

While the Legislature has not prorogued and Premier Norris and his cabinet still hold office, they hold their positions only temporarily since they were defeated in the Legislature.
