SLUICE GOLD FROM UPPER PEACE RIVER

Party Being Made Up in Edmonton to Handle Pay Dirt in North.

EDMONTON, Mar. 28.—J. T. Smith, civil and mining engineer of New York, is in the city making up a party of miners to sluice for gold on the upper reaches of the Peace this summer. Mr. Smith has had previous experience on the northern stream and he is of the opinion that the new company which is putting in a large suction dredge on the Peace "has one of the best propositions in Canada." He has operated similar machinery on the Erie Canal in the United States and states that the dirt was handled there for less than 15 cents per yard and that it should be possible to accomplish the same work on the Peace for seven or eight cents.

There is no question as to gold being in the Peace in paying quantities, says the visitor. When he was at Hudson's Hope the miners washing on the river bars made an average of \$20 per day when the river was low, and his party expects to do quite as well, although they will have no equipment with the exception of the usual sluice boxes. The Smith party is operating strictly on a co-operative basis. Five local men are already signed on to go in, but twelve in all will be included in the group. They are en route in via Prince George, Summit Lake and the Crooked River, travelling down the Peace as soon as the ice goes out.

A letter from the Song of Canada asking that daylight saving be put into effect here this year was received by the city council last night and filed for future reference.

The fire department had a call at 4:30 yesterday afternoon to the Rupert Marine Ironworks where an engine had backfired and gasoline had ignited. The blaze was quickly extinguished without damage.

A report from the Board of Works recommending the use of cement catch basins on the roadwork on Second and Third Avenues at an estimated cost of less than \$2 per foot was adopted by the city council last night.

A letter from A. W. Gray, secretary of the Union of B. C. Municipalities, setting forth the dues of the city for the year 1922 as \$40, was received by the city council last night and referred to the Finance Committee for action.

Mrs. Rood could not identify the man but it is believed by the police from general description that it is the same man who was arrested last night on a burglary charge.

PRINCE RUPERT

The G. T. P. assessment agreement and the municipal free library bylaws were finally adopted at the meeting of the city council last night. This followed the report of E. A. Woods, returning officer, that both bylaws had passed the vote of the taxpayers.

The letter from the Inter-Empire Trade Organization, urging the support of the city council towards the stimulation of Imperial trade, seems to be the council's joker this season. It was laid on the table for another week by the city fathers last night. This is the fifth time that it has been thus dealt with.

The offer of J. Postulo to give the city a clear deed to two lots on First Avenue near Seventh Street if the city will remove rock to grade on four lots was accepted by the council last night on recommendation of the finance committee. There is a provision that there shall be enough rock to warrant the taking of the crusher there.

On recommendation of the Board of Works, the city council last night decided to allow C. H. Orme to use old planks from Park Avenue for building an 8-foot sidewalk on Vanarsdol Avenue, Westview, to his home. The council had been petitioned to put in this street but there were not sufficient signatures, so Mr. Orme is putting in the walk himself.

The Elks have been granted the exclusive use of the Aeropolis Hill sports grounds for their celebration on Victoria Day, May 24. The proceeds of the celebration will be used for Boy Scouts and Girl Guides work. A motion granting the use of the grounds passed the council last night. Ralph Lepine and B. F. Sell, members of the celebration committee, appeared at the meeting.

Three general borrowing by-laws, totalling \$100,000 were given their first and second readings at last night's council meeting. The money is to be raised for general city purposes from the Royal Bank of Canada and the total tax collection for the year will be security. Similar bylaws are passed every year to carry on the city's finances until taxes are collected.
