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CITY'S POSITION IS ARBITRARY AND NOT JUST IT IS CLAIMED

A letter from the Canadian National Dry Dock and Shipyards, signed by J. H. Pillsbury, manager, in which it was claimed that the city had taken an unjust and arbitrary position in refusing refund of power account for the months of December and January and could be forced to make the refund if steps were taken, was received and filed by the council last night. Ald. Montgomery proposed that the letter go to the utilities committee but Ald. Perry, chairman of that committee, said that would be of no avail for the committee had already done all it could do on the matter.

CAN CITY COUNCIL ADOPT NEW TIME?

That is Ald. Montgomery's Query in Regard to Daylight Saving—Information Being Sought.

Ald. Montgomery has questioned the authority of the city council to cancel standard time and adopt daylight saving, claiming that if storekeepers were inclined to disregard the order and do business on standard time hours the city could not prosecute them. Further advice is being sought from the attorney-general, the city solicitor, at the present time, holding the view that, under provincial enactment, the city council is authorized in changing the time.

HOSPITAL RESOLUTION OF TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL IS ENDORSED

The resolution emanating from the Trades and Labor Council, recommending the appointment of a commission by the provincial government to go into hospital matters with a view to reforms in financial management and systems generally, which was last week endorsed by the hospital board, in turn received the endorsement of the city council last night. Now that the Trades and Labor Council has received the support of all interested local governing bodies it is understood that the resolution will be sent further afield to city councils and hospital boards in other cities of the province for endorsement.
