

Painting of patched plaster in operating room.

Linoleum strips for case-room.

Kalsomining corridors and ceilings on first, second and third floors.

Cutting of seven-foot arch in nursery including removing of present lockers.

Up-to-date basin for nursery.

New linoleum for nursery.

Kalsomining of certain rooms on second floor.

Curtains for the women's public wards.

General renovation of diet kitchen on first and second floors including painting, new shelving, etc. Linoleum salvaged from nursery to be used outside main kitchen.

Renovation of chartroom on first floor including kalsomining, painting and varnishing.

Painting and kalsomining of service rooms and laboratories on first and second floors.

Repairing of floor in secretary's office.

Kalsomining and painting of woodwork in main kitchen.

Renovating of darkroom and installing of diaphragm table in x-ray room.

Painting of walls and ceiling of laundry.

Kalsomining of basement ward.

Repairs to floors of wards and varnishing and painting.

Replacement of shelving and trays in diet kitchens.

Patching of diet kitchen on second floor.

Installation of cupboards and shelves in secretary's office.
