WIRELESS STATION FOR STEWART SOON

An up-to-date wireless station is to be installed at Stewart in the near future, according to several letters which have been received in town lately from Victoria, says the Portland Canal News. This station will be up-to-date and modern in every respect, with sufficiently strong sending and receiving instruments to be able to reach Vancouver and Victoria direct. The cost of installation and construction is estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$10,000. Negotiations for the site have been under way for some weeks past. It is understood, though as yet nothing definite on this point can be ascertained, that the site selected is on the tide flats about where the old Ocean View cabaret used to stand. Thus, being at the shore end of the dock approach, it will be most convenient for all concerned. As this is government property there should be no difficulty in securing it.

EXPERIENCE OF LOGGER

Edward Cullum Was Overcome by Gas at Swanson Bay and Nearly Expired.
Edward Cullum, a hand logger, had a narrow escape from death as a result of having been overcome by fumes in his gas boat at Swanson Bay last Friday. Cullum, together with his partner C. Gault, arrived at Swanson Bay from Ocean Falls on Thursday night. They slept on the boat that night and on Friday morning Napoleon MacLaine, a friend of Cullum's, called at the boat. He aroused Gault but Cullum, who they thought was still asleep, did not respond. Gault and MacLaine left the boat and returned at 2 o'clock and Cullum was apparently still asleep. Leaving again they returned at 9 o'clock and still Cullum did not answer. They became alarmed and dragged Cullum outside, calling at the same time for Provincial Constable Martin, who was there, and Dr. Street.
Dr. Street stated that Cullum had been overcome by gas and administered an anaesthetic. After working on the man until 4:30 o'clock on Saturday morning, Constable Martin removed him to the hospital where, at the time of the officer's leaving for Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon, he was making favorable progress although the physician had previously given up hope of his recovery.

CHINESE PLEADED GUILTY TO CHARGES AND ARE PUNISHED

Hah Bon Chee, charged with having opium in his possession, was fined \$200, with the option of six months imprisonment, on pleading guilty in the police court this morning. Hon Jin charged with smoking opium, also pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and costs.

Sport Chat

In rebuttal of the criticism made by the Fair board as to the care that was taken of the Exhibition Hall during the winter, the Basketball Association officials state that the hall was in none too good shape when they took hold of it last fall and was, in fact, in a dirty condition then. No matter with whom the blame lies, the place was in rather bad order at the end of the basketball season and possibly, there might have been more careful supervision of the premises by both the Fair board and the Basketball association. Care should be taken in future to see that a similar condition does not arise again, especially in view of the fact that such fine improvements were put in recently by the Exhibition association. The place will now be more suitable than ever for indoor games with the new floor and the lining of the walls and particular efforts should be made to take care of it. The Basketball association should remember that were it not for this Fair building they might have difficulty in staging games and practices at such frequent intervals as has been possible during the past winter.

The leading long distance swimmers in the world are to be invited to compete in a common tournament this year at swimming the English Channel, it is announced in London. An international relay race, open to men and women, may also be organized for the Channel coast. A great boom in long distance swimming is forecast following the action of Adolph Alexander, president of the Channel Swimming Club, in presenting that institution with a new cup to be competed for by aspirants of all nationalities. It will become the property of the first man or woman who successfully swims the Channel unaided as did Captain Webb and "Big Bill" Burgess. Mr. Alexander considers the Channel swim the greatest athletic feat of which man is capable and the best incentive to long distance swimming which is regarded by him as the only useful form of the art.

Protests of anglers against closing trout fishing from Feb. 16 to May 15 have been successful and the department of fisheries has issued a notice of an amendment which establishes the close season from Dec. 1 to the last day of February. So the spring anglers may continue to whip the streams. The regulations apply to cutthroat and rainbow trout west of the 121st meridian, which roughly cuts the province a few miles east of Spence's bridge on the C. P. R. railway and at Bend on the Canadian National. It thus includes all Prince Rupert district.
