COUNTRY IS GOING AHEAD

C. N. R. Resources Agent Sees Steady Growth From Figures.

"Official figures on immigration, building and farming show that the country as a whole is forging steadily ahead," said E. A. Blow, of the Canadian National Railways Resources Department, who returned to Winnipeg this morning after having spent a few days in the city on business in connection with his department.

"Now that the post-war troubles are disappearing there is every reason to hope that development in every line of endeavor, but especially in agriculture, will continue to increase each succeeding year, and on a sound and permanent basis. All colonization agencies in the United States and overseas report an immense number of enquiries regarding Western Canada, more than for many years past, so that, in spite of present restrictions, we may expect a goodly influx of settlers right along of the type that the country wants.

Mr. Blow said official figures showed that in 1921 there were 34,304 more resident farmers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia than there were in 1920, the increases in Saskatchewan being 16,908 and in Alberta 11,084. In the four provinces there was an increase in field production of 160,676,906 bushels over the production of 1920, while the value of the output of the dairies of the three prairie provinces aggregated \$36,363,876, each province showing a very substantial increase over 1920, with every indication of a very much greater expansion this year.

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Building Activities. "Building activities also were not so insignificant in 1921 as many may have supposed, when figures are viewed in the aggregate," continued Mr. Blow. "About one-third of the towns and villages on Canadian National Railway lines in the west that furnished reports show a total expenditure for urban and farm buildings of \$31,652,637 in the year. Business structures accounted for over six and three-quarter million dollars; urban dwellings, six and a quarter millions; farm buildings, over five millions; industrial buildings, two and a half millions, and municipal improvements over seven millions. If all places had reported the total figures would have probably been more than doubled. Towns having a population of over 5000 and cities are not included in the reports received."

Figures Confusing. Mr. Blow pointed out that it was a common practice for people to point to the large immigration into the United States, the total influx of all classes being set down as a net gain to the population. But when they have been subjected to analysis these total

figures assumed an entirely different significance than they appeared to have done when accepted as a gross result. For instance, in 1919 U. S. immigration statistics showed that 237,021 entered the country, but it appeared that when allowance is made for non-immigrant aliens, those making a temporary trip, those that were debared for one disability or another, and the flood of emigration from the country, the net gain in population for that year was only 20,700. In 1920 out of 624,576 entering the country only 192,544 could be claimed as an addition to the population. These figures showed that people were leaving the United States, so that when we heard of a few leaving our shores there was no necessity for letting it interfere with our sleep.

"The world is not standing still these days. People are going and coming constantly, and will continue to do so to the end of time. Many of those who are leaving Canada return sooner or later and are better citizens, for they learn that there are opportunities here today that can not be found in any other part of the continent."
