William Lyon Macken- zie King in the House of Commons yesterday condemned the Imperial conference agreements as wrong in principle and detail, as a menace to world peace and goodwill, a danger to Canada's trade with foreign countries and further application of the vicious policy of high protection. CONFERENCE IN GENEVA

Germany's Arms Equality Demands Will Be Threshed Out In League City

LONDON, Oct. 18:-After two days of conference here, Premier Edouard Herriot of France and Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain agreed definitely on the holding of a four-power conference of Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany to consider Germany's demand for arms equality in Geneva rather than in London as at first advocated by Premier MacDonald. Italy is also in accord with the moving of the scene of the proposed conference from London to Gen-

Germany approves of the conference but objects to changing the venue from London to Geneva on the grounds that it will really mean the re-entering of Germany into the disarmament conference which it has refused to rejoin until after its arms equality demand has been settled. However, it is felt in official quarters that Germany's refusal is merely temporary.
