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BRITISH PREFERENCE

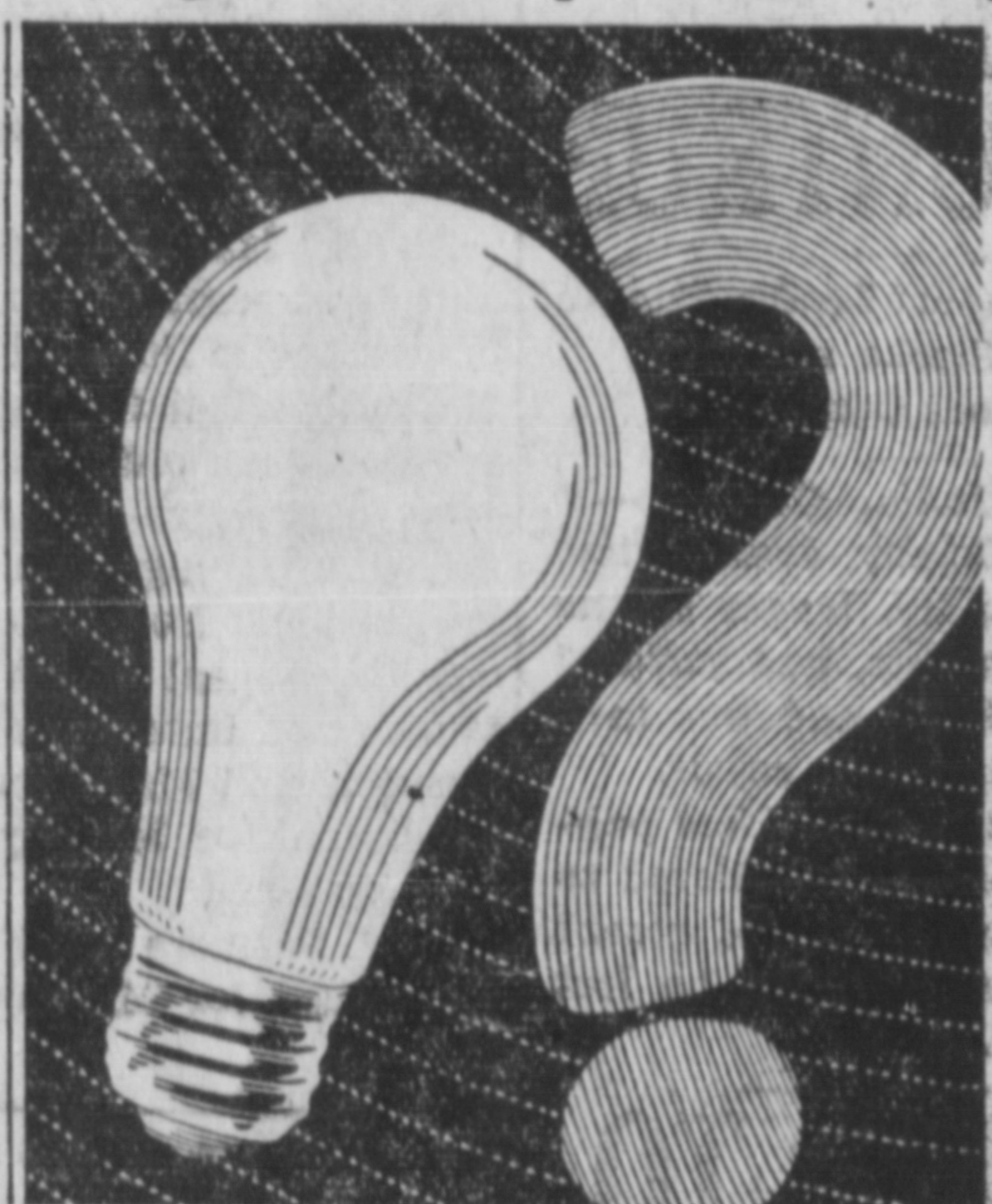
Premier Bennett has arranged for Empire preferences on a good many articles imported by Canada and has secured in return a preference in the British market for a good many articles which Canada might export. That seems to us like a pretty good deal. How it will work out in actual practice remains to be seen. At any rate it is an attempt in the right direction.

Mackenzie King wishes to reduce the tariff without any corresponding advantage.

Of the two we rather like the plan of the Premier. A reciprocal agreement seems the proper arrangement. It is what Liberals stood for in 1911 when they made a reciprocal agreement with the United States and the country turned it down.

At any rate Premier Bennett has a large majority in the Canadian House of Commons and it is presumed he will carry his agreements into effect. Before the country is asked to pass upon them they will have been proved to be beneficial or otherwise. If they prove beneficial there is no good reason why they should be opposed. Why not forget party politics long enough to put the new policy into effect? This is an occasion when we may well judge by results and not speculate as to the future.

NEW STOCK AT TELKWA

Farmers of That District Interested in Bettering Herd

TELKWA, Oct. 18.—The farmers in the Telkwa district here are interested in the improvement of their breeding stock and building up their herds. J. McNeil imported five excellent Hereford heifers and Guy Farrow purchased twenty good quality Shorthorn heifers at Edmonton and shipped this stock in under the Dominion Government free freight policy. The price on breeding stock is particularly attractive from the standpoint of the buyer at present. Many farmers are availing themselves of the opportunity of low prices and free freight—to enlarge their herds or get started with real good foundation stock. The above shipment is the first importation to the Telkwa district for some years. The good pure bred bulls loaned the farmers in this area under the Dominion Government policy has stimulated a great interest in improved breeding and feeding of livestock in the Central Interior of British Columbia.
