

### **Bootlegging Must Stop** and Government Ready to Step In If Needed :

VICTORIA, May 3.—In keeping with authorized reports appearing in Vancouver papers yesterday, Attorney General A. M. Manson declared last evening that bootlegging in every part of the province must be eliminated and a careful campaign against illicit vendors was to be carried on.

Following his return from Victoria, the minister was informed that "booze rings" and small operators were carrying on their trade in some of the central and northern districts. #### Fully Equipped Passenger Trains Will Operate From Prince Rupert Every Day

The announcement is made today by George A. McNicholl, Canadian National Railway Assistant General Freight and Passenger Agent, that daily passenger train service to and from Prince Rupert over the Grand Trunk Pacific end of the Canadian National Railways will commence with the putting into efect of the summer service on June 4.

Under the new service the eastbound passenger train will cave here daily except Sundays at 6.45 (Standard Time) in the evening connecting as usual on boat days with the steamers ar-
