T. L. COUNCIL WELCOMES NEW LADY DELEGATE

Miss H. T. Hitchey is First Lady to Attend Meeting of Council as Delegate

FAIR WAGE AND REFORM IN HOSPITALS TAKEN UP

The Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council welcomed its first lady delegate at the meeting on Tuesday night in the person of Miss H. E. Hitchey representing the Civic Employees' Union.

G. B. Casey gave a report outlining the plans and policy of the newly formed union. Seven unions in all were represented at the meeting.

It was decided to ask Hon. A. Mansson, minister of labor, to take the necessary steps towards adopting and recognizing the Union rates in all parts of the province as the fair wage standard for all government work and all other undertakings, public or private, subsidized by the government.

A committee of three was appointed to wait upon the hospital board, the city council and the Central Labor Council asking them to endorse a plan for the operating of all public hospitals and medical attendance as provincial institutions supported by the government along lines similar to the operation of the schools.

President S. D. Macdonald gave a report telling of a cordial reception received and success achieved at the conference with the Board of Trade when he had asked for a joint committee with the board on labor matters.

It was decided that President Macdonald, Ald. R. A. McLeod and Len Dewhurst would represent the Trades and Labor Council on the joint committee with the Board of Trade.

POLICE REPORT FOR MONTH OF APRIL IS PRESENTED TO BOARD

The report of the chief of police for the month of April presented to the police commission at its meeting last night showed that there had been 20 cases brought before the magistrate in the police court during the month and fines had totalled \$695. Of the 26 cases, there had been 20 convictions, 3 dismissals, one withdrawal and 3 cases pending. There were three convictions under the Opium and Narcotic Drug Act. During the month 10 raids had been undertaken by the police in search for drugs. Under the Moderation Act there were nine convictions, eight for intoxication and one for having unsealed liquor in possession. The city was in a very orderly condition according to the report. Weights of bread and coal were tested and found to be correct.
