**PROTEST HIGH AUTO TAXES**

**Quebec Pays as High as \$250 a Year for Right to Operate Truck.**

**ELIMINATE PATRONAGE.**

MONTREAL, March 8.—An emergency meeting of the directors of the Automobile Club of Canada was called together yesterday to discuss measures for the protection of owners and users of passenger cars and automobile trucks who are highly indignant at the increased provincial tax collectable March 1.

The new tax is 90 cents per horse power or fraction thereof as against 70 cents; and \$50 per ton capacity on each motor truck of every class, plus \$1 for the number plates. The charge of \$5 for a license to drive is maintained. Resolutions of protest against this new schedule were adopted at the meeting and will be communicated to the proper authorities. The new increase is out of all proportion, it was claimed. Motorists feel that they are being called upon to pay more than their share.

**\$50 For Ford.**

If unreasonable taxation is the only way of continuing our road work let us retard highway construction until such time as we have more cars to which a reasonable tax can be applied and the necessary monies obtained for our road policy," declared one of the club's officials. Taxes on a Ford one-ton truck, a popular commercial vehicle used by grocers, butchers and for light delivery had increased during the year from \$16.10 to \$50. Six dollars for plate and driving license was added in each case. The new tax for a five-ton truck which cannot operate outside the city, is \$251 compared with \$125 last year, and in addition the trucks must travel at four miles per hour in accordance with the amendment to the city charter granted by the legislature. The argument was also advanced that climatic conditions here restrict the operation of cars and trucks to only a few months of the year.

**HIGHER TAXES HERE.**

Nevertheless, motor car taxation in this province has always been greater, and in some cases double of that in other provinces. The lateness of the decision increasing the tax which was announced only last Saturday, was also deplored, as many have sent in their annual tax made out on the forms in accordance with last year's basis. The consensus of opinion was that the Government has acted too hastily, and that the full effect of such drastic taxation has not been sufficiently studied.

It was also decided to forward a petition to the Government to appoint a commission to take charge of all the road work in this province. This measure is advocated, not because any fault has been found with the ministers in charge of that department in particular, but in order that the political aspect may be removed, with subsequent economy of operations in highway construction and maintenance throughout the province.

trains to the beaches if the bill now before the provincial house becomes law, officials of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National lines announced today.

Local officers of the Canadian National Railway company are in favor of running Sunday trains, and already, following the vote in the legislature Thursday, Assistant Passenger Traffic Manager R. Greenham has been instructed to institute inquiries into the matter.

A. E. Warren, general manager of western lines, today stated it residents of the province asked for Sunday trains to the beaches, and the legislature, by vote of the house, had favored them, he personally could see no reason why such service should not be provided.

D. C. Coleman, vice-president and manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, said: "If made legal, and there is any demand for the service, we are prepared to run the Sunday trains to the beaches."

**NO ACTION TAKEN.**

Are Winnipeg ministers and the Lord's Day Alliance lying low on the Sunday trains to the beaches bill, or will they let the legislation be put through the house unopposed?

Querries put to prominent city clergy, including Dr. R. S. Laidlaw, president of the Lord's Day Alliance and Rev. B. B. Jonsson, president of the Ministerial association, elicited nothing more definite than "We are not taking any action at present."

Dr. Laidlaw said: "As far as I know, the Lord's Day Alliance is doing nothing to oppose the bill. I would not like to predict they will take any action in the future."

Mr. Jonsson said: "The association has done nothing, and will do nothing, about the Sunday trains."
