ALASKAN OBJECTION TAKEN TO FISHING CENTRE HERE EXPLAINED AT WASHINGTON

H. C. Strong, one of the large property owners of Ketchikan and part owner of the cold storage and canneries in the district, appeared recently before the marine and fisheries committee of the House of Representatives at Washington.

Here is a map of Alaska as it lies in connection with the Dominion of Canada. During the past few years the Canadians have built a transcontinental line across the country, terminating at Prince Rupert.

Mr. Chindblom—What point in Alaska?
Mr. Strong—Any point where there are good harbor facilities. My home is 90 miles from Prince Rupert. It is not a thing that would require them to go to any particular point, but to establish a terminus in Alaska.

Mr. Strong—Shorter and quicker, but the unfortunate part of it is that the Canadian regulations, geographical position and everything goes to centre the fishing industry at this terminus at Prince Rupert.

Mr. Strong—Even to western Alaska. Of course it hurts southeastern Alaska materially. These vessels take their catches to Prince Rupert. There they are bought by the agents who really represent the American consumers.


Now, they do intend to have a Canadian mosquito fleet to operate out of Prince Rupert for the Grand Trunk Railway and the Canadian Pacific Railroad would like to have the same out of Vancouver for their line to pick up Alaska business and get the rail freight across the continent.

Mr. Strong—Do we not want to build up our own country?
Mr. Hardy—I think we can carry it to an extreme and make our people suffer.

Activity in District Is Quiet Now That the Dolly Varden Railway Is Closed.

ALICE ARM, Mar. 17.—The people of Alice Arm are anxiously awaiting definite word as to the intentions of the Taylor Mining Co. with regard to the operation of the Dolly Varden railway this year.

It is reported here that the Taylor Company has raised a sum of \$100,000 to continue work on the Dolly Varden and Wolf mines this year and that the government is being approached to take over operation of the railroad when the charter of the company expires.
