Tenders for twenty tons of steam coal for the city hall were opened by the city council last night. The prices ranged from \$8.90 to \$12.50 and the matter was referred to the finance committee with power to act.

A letter from R. R. Nicholl, assistant tax commissioner of the G.T.P. Development Co., Ltd., was read at the city council meeting last night asking for a rebate of \$170 from the tax sale surplus. The matter was referred to the city solicitor for an opinion.

A. L. Carruthers, provincial government district engineer, wrote to the city council last night stating that the road over the G.T.P. tracks from Third Avenue to Cow Bay was in need of repair and suggesting that the city look into the matter. It was left to the board of works.

The decision of the city council last night to discharge all civic employees will affect 40 people. It was learned this morning. This ruling will include the electrical, telephone, treasurer's, city clerk's and fire departments. It does not affect the police who are under the jurisdiction of the police commission.

The city engineer and city solicitor both reported to the city council last night that Nicholas Tomashensky had no claim against the city for water from the Booth School flooding his basement. They pointed out that it was the natural watercourse and that he should have diverted its course.

F. A. McDiarmid, parliamentary agent for the Union of B.C. Municipalities, wrote to the city council last night regarding the proposed repeal of Section 9, of the Local Improvement Act. The Union, he stated, did not press at Victoria to have this abolished, but Burnaby was free to do so. The letter was ordered filed.
