PROGRAM FOR CELEBRATION

Announcement by Sons of Canada—Many Big Athletic Features.

Children's events and senior races in the morning and four big games in the afternoon and evening will be the features of the Dominion Day celebration, the program for which has just been arranged and made public by the Sons of Canada, under whose auspices the celebration of Canada's birthday is to be held.

At 9:30 in the morning, headed by the band of the 102nd, Northern B.C. Battalion, there will be a monster children's parade from the provincial government buildings to the Aeroplane Grounds.

The opener at the grounds will be a Junior Baseball game between the White Sox and the Tiny Tims followed by children's sports and senior races, including half mile relay

race and 100 yard dash. Candy will be distributed free to the kiddies in the morning and there will be no admission fee, the grounds.

Afternoon Games.

At 1 o'clock in the afternoon, there will be the ~~Domino Day~~ final baseball game between the Sons of Canada and the winners of the Elks-Knights of Columbus series for the special prize. The ~~Domino Day~~ final ball cup between the Sons of Canada and the Callies will open at 3:30 and will complete the afternoon's bill.

Commencing at 7 o'clock in the evening, the first exhibition of Canada's national game, lacrosse, in Prince Rupert will be seen and at 8 o'clock, the Grotto and Sons of Canada will play an intermediate baseball game.

A dance at the rink in the evening preceding Dominion Day is also really a part of the Dominion Day program. It is to be given under the auspices of the Sons of Canada and the Adair Cars Chapter, Daughters of the Empire.

SENSATIONAL BALL GAME

Sons of Canada Made Wonderful Comeback When Elks Blew Up.

One of the most sensational baseball games ever played on the local diamond and by far the best and most exciting of this season was the Senior League fixture last night between the Sons of Canada and the Elks which resulted in a 5 to 4 victory for the former. Howard Frizzell pitched for the Elks for eight innings and part of the ninth when he began to show weakness and, after allowing two hits, a run was replaced by Fred Hale. When the smoke of the battle cleared after the second half of the ninth the Sons of Canada, who had been blanked for eight frames, had brought in five runs, just sufficient to win the game which, up to the very end, had looked like victory for the Elks. The fans were thus treated to an anti-climax such as they do not often have the thrill of feeling.

Though opinions may differ and there may have been some reason for pulling their young hurler in the ninth, the general consensus of opinion is that in so doing the Elks' management lost the game. The outcome goes to prove it.
