Ford is Fighting The Coal Profiteers

CHAIRMAN DUFF FISHERIES COMMISSION TALKS OF INDUSTRY

Brokers Profiteering in Coal Eastern United States Says Ford Who is Fighting Them

DETROIT, Aug. 29.—Following Henry Ford's announcement a few days ago that the Ford plants will be closed on September 16 because of conditions in the coal industry, it is said by sources close to the manufacturer today that he began the fight for what he believed to be a great principle. He had started the fight against all profiteering in coal.

Ford denies that there's a coal shortage. His investigations convince him that there is an enormous coal supply in the hands of the brokers.

For several weeks Ford's company has been flooded with offers for coal delivery guaranteed at prices from one hundred to three hundred per cent above normal cost.

ANTHRACITE COAL STRIKE NEAR ITS END

That is Opinion of U.S. Administration; Opposed to Radical Action

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29.—It was understood that President Harding and many members of the United States congress are opposed to the idea of the government taking over some of the mines and the idea will be dropped.

It was the general belief in administration circles last night that the strike of anthracite miners would be ended in a few days. A new agreement, now in formation, is meeting the prejudices of both sides, it is said.

JAP GAMBLER KILLS CHINK

Is Now Being Sought by Police in Vancouver Where he Shot Old Man

VANCOUVER, Aug. 29.—When he attempted to prevent an unnamed Japanese gambler making a getaway with \$20 which the Japanese lost in a game yesterday Sue Sin, an aged Chinaman, was shot to death. The authorities are scouring the city in an attempt to find the murderer.

HOSPITAL BOARD GETS ITS MONEY

Report Shows That Institution Owes \$12,393.75 With Sum of \$1,950 Due

The city council last night decided to turn over to the hospital board a grant of \$5,272.29, this amount being half of the liquor profits coming to the city from the provincial government. A report was submitted showing that the hospital will owe, on August 31, the sum of \$12,393.75 with \$1,950 in municipal and government grants due. There was a lengthy discussion in the course of which Ald. Montgomery charged the hospital board with mismanagement, stating that charges were exorbitant and there must be a leak somewhere.

SCHOONER LEONOR SOLD AT VICTORIA

Fetches Only Half the Charges Against Her at Auction Yesterday

VICTORIA, Aug. 29.—The auxiliary schooner Leonor, picked up in the Gulf of California by the cruiser Rainbow during the war as a suspect, was sold here yesterday by auction in order to pay for the upkeep expenses during the last six years.

There were only two bidders and the boat went to W. R. Dre-witt of Victoria for \$3,650, less than half the upkeep expenses.

GREEKS EVACUATE IMPORTANT POINT IN ASIA MINOR

LONDON, August 29.—The Greeks have evacuated Afium-karshissar under force of the Turkish Nationalist attack says an Athens dispatch. This important central point in the Greek line in Asia Minor was yielded in face of superior Turkish forces.

C.P.R. MAY TAKE OVER C.N. TRackage IN THE COWICHAN LAKE DISTRICT

VICTORIA, Aug. 29.—Unconfirmed rumors have it that D. C. Coleman, vice-president of the C.P.R., is now in Victoria investigating the possibilities of taking over part of the Canadian National trackage in the Cowichan district to give access to the timber limits in the Cowichan lake region.

LOSS OF LIFE CHILEAN SHIP

Passengers Numbered 150 and Crew 72 All Went Down

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 29.—The Chilean steamer Hale, 2200 tons, sank today off the Chilean coast. All the passengers numbering 150 and the crew of 72 were lost.

BIG DROP IN BOOZE PRICE

Government Stores Will be Selling Cheaper After Thursday This Week

VICTORIA, Aug. 29.—Sharp reductions in liquor prices will be gazetted by the provincial government on Thursday effective that day. Even heavier cuts will be made in the prices of beer and light wines than had been previously decided upon. Hard liquor reductions alone will take \$750,000 from this year's profits.

GENERAL STRIKE FRANCE TODAY

French Extremist Federation Call Men Out in Sympathy With Havre

PARIS, Aug. 29.—Mounted guards and strong police forces were thrown around the big industrial centres of France today owing to the big 24 hour strike called for today by the extremist labor federation in sympathy with the Havre workers who struck last week.

RACING INTERESTS FIGHT PROHIBITION RACING AT OAK BAY

Application to Quash Bylaw to Come Before Mr. Justice Morrison Tomorrow

VANCOUVER, Aug. 29.—Tomorrow Mr. Justice Morrison will hear an application from the racing interests when the Oak Bay Municipality will be required to show cause why the Horse Racing Prevention Bylaw should not be quashed.

The claim is made that the Oak Bay municipality is not competent to pass such a measure and the Provincial Legislature has no right to give them powers of that kind.

Oak Bay is an organized municipality on the outskirts of Victoria where the Willows race track is situated.

PROSPECTOR CAUSED FIRE KLEANZA VALLEY

USK, Aug. 29.—It is reported that a prospector who was camping at 8 mile up Kleanza Valley, about 9 miles from Usk, last week left his camp-fire burning and thereby set the Crown timber afire.

AGAINST PROHIBITION Sweden Gives Majority of 45,000 Favor of Liquor

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 29.—The final count in the liquor referendum in Sweden shows that there is a majority of 45,000 against prohibition in that country.

DROWNED AT NANAIMO

NANAIMO, Aug. 29.—Joe Tom and his four-year-old son was drowned from a launch near here. The lad fell into the water and the father tried to save him.

WELSH COAL FOR THIS CONTINENT

Pressure on Mines in Old Country Increases Daily—Canadian Demand.

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A question of immediate practical interest, raised in England by the American demand for British coal, is that of the capacity of the British mining industry to meet the demands with the least injury to the requirements of other customers.

The pressure continues to increase, and it is estimated that the American requirement will soon approximate 100,000 tons a day. The tonnage already taken up, however, does not justify that estimate, for the figure reported since the boom began represents a deadweight capacity of between 600,000 and 700,000 tons only. A circumstance to be reckoned with is the advent of Canadian business.

There are many indications of shortage in the supply of bituminous and anthracite coal from the United States on which Canada, under normal conditions, depends exclusively, and in the event of a continuance of the coal and railway difficulties in the United States, a strong demand for large supplies of English coal from Canada will doubtless soon have to be reckoned with. Coincided with the inquiries from America, there is a growing demand from Germany and the Scandinavian countries for Northumberland, Durham, Yorkshire and Scottish coal.

MEN TRAPPED IN GOLD MINE

Cut Off in Blind Tunnels by Fire and Await Death

JACKSON, California, Aug. 29.—Down at the bottom of a great argonaut gold mine, nearly a mile below the surface, 48 miners have been trapped by fire in blind tunnels since midnight Sunday and await the self-same fate to end their lives if it has not already done so. A rescue crew is bending every effort to effect a rescue.

The mine superintendent declared they may not be able to reach the entombed men for 48 hours.

FRENCH FEDERATION OF LABOR OPPOSED TO STRIKE AT PARIS

PARIS, Aug. 29.—The Conservative federation of labor has decided against the general strike called for tomorrow in Paris in sympathy with the strikers at Havre. Instead, demonstrations of protest will be held and the federation of labor will contribute one day's pay to the strikers at Havre.

Change Fishing Industry From Seasonal to All Year Round Occupation for White People

VANCOUVER, Aug. 29.—If the British Columbia fishing industry is to be developed to its fullest extent, means must be found to change it from a seasonal occupation to one which could be followed the year round, declared William Duff, M.P., chairman of the Fisheries Commission in an interview here today.

Salmon fishing will always be a seasonal one, said Mr. Duff, but halibut, cod, herring and flat fish should support a large white fishing population the year round.

MEN CONFESS TRAIN WRECK

Police Declare Widespread Sabotage Plot Has Been Unearthed

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—A confession of actual participation in wrecking the express train near Gary, Indiana, recently by the removal of spikes from the rails were made by four men. All are declared to be striking shopmen and are held in connection with the disaster which cost the lives of two engineers, according to the police.

It was indicated that no union officials were implicated in the plot. The authorities assert that they had unearthed evidence of widespread sabotage plans which developed at small meetings unauthorized by union officials.

An unocial message says civilians were killed and wounded. Reinforcements arrived and the republicans were driven off.

STEAMER GREY GONE ASHORE

Had Wabash in Tow in Active Pass and Both Are Aground

VANCOUVER, Aug. 29.—In a heavy fog the freighter Wabash and the whaling steamer Gray went aground this morning in Active Pass. It is expected the Wabash will be refloated at high tide.

A salvage vessel is on her way to the aid of the two vessels. Neither is believed to be in danger.

Active Pass is a narrow strait north of Mayne Island about half way between Victoria and Vancouver.
