RADIO SETS FOR HOSPITAL

Victoria Proposing Installation for Patients Who are Bed-ridden.

VICTORIA, Aug. 25.—Who will sponsor the installation of wireless telephone instruments in the new wing of the Royal Provincial Hospital, so that some 200 patients in perpetuity may enjoy the delights of radio concerts while bed-ridden? That is the question that is exercising the management of the hospital.

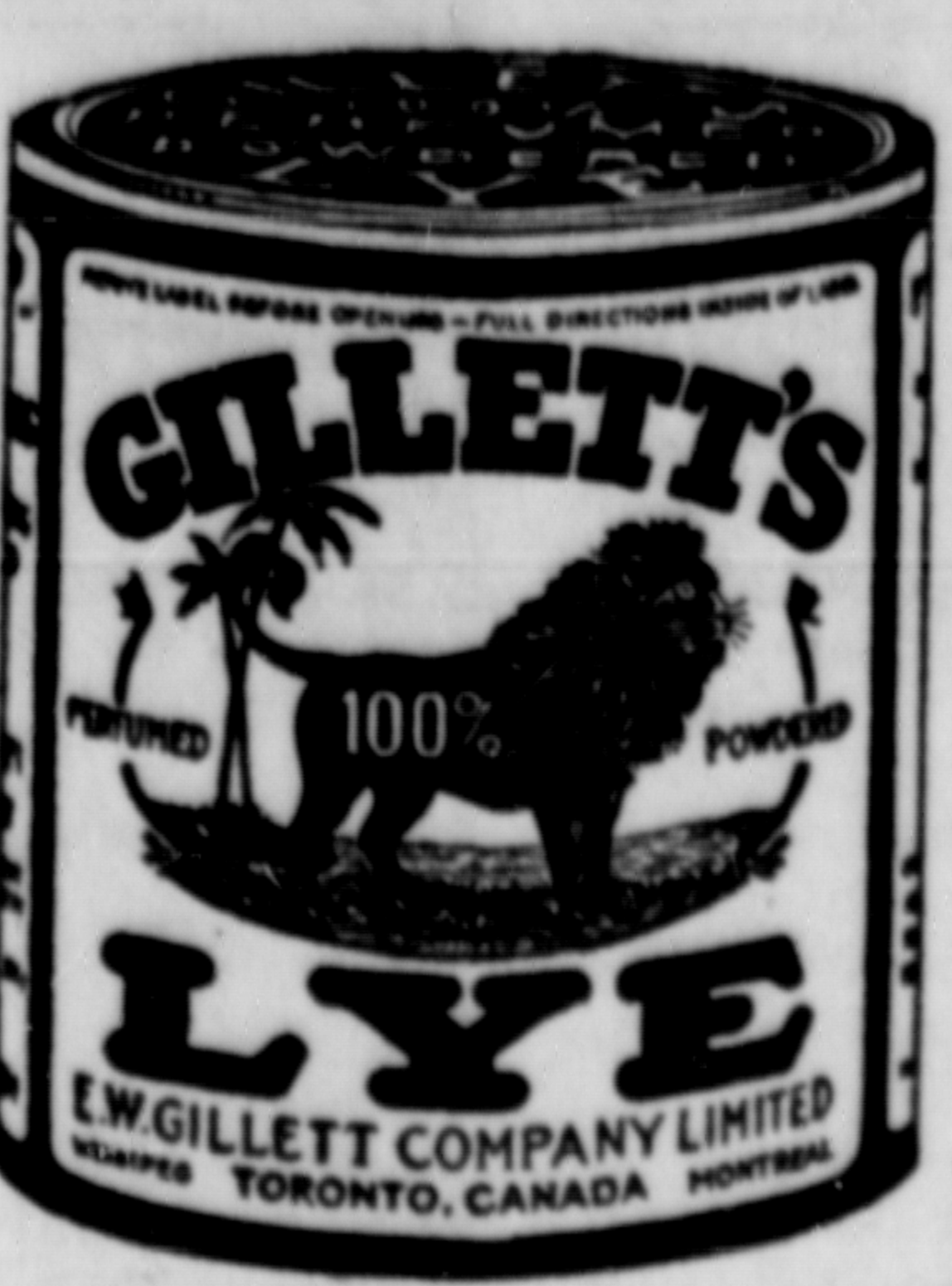
A member of the Hospital Board outlined the tentative plans which it is hoped may be carried into effect with aid from some generous well-wisher. It appears that conduits for individual telephones are now to be laid to every ward, public and private, in the new wing. These conduits could carry another wire, and it has been suggested that this facility should not be allowed to remain unused.

Authorities Support Plan.

Wires from a central receiving station, carrying the multitudinous messages of the ether in the form of radio concerts, stock reports, addresses and all matters of interest, could be placed in these conduits at this stage, but not later. The hospital authorities are so impressed with the real and beneficial value of this recreation that they now authorize a public appeal for funds to bring this about.

Cost of Installation.

While the cost of the installation might be deemed excessive investigation into the equipment needed will show, it is hoped, that the radio telephones might be installed at a figure that would be well within the means of even one public-spirited resident. It is pointed out that all that is required would be the slight additional wiring in the present conduits and a cen-



tral receiving station. The hospital, with its high location would be thus placed within radio news and concerts from a distance of 3,000 miles or more.

The installation of radio telephones for the benefit of hospital patients is not a new idea, as the scheme has been fostered with a great degree of success in Eastern Canada and south of the line. The benefit to bed-ridden patients is said to be incalculable. The cost of operation, once installation was complete, of such a station would be very moderate, it is said.

NORRIS OF MANITOBA GOES BACK TO FARM

Says He Will Have Twenty Bushels to Acre of Wheat This Year

"I can run a binder just as well as I ever could," said T. C. Norris, former premier of Manitoba, who paid a short visit to the parliament buildings, after spending the past ten days on the farm, says the Free Press.

Mr. Norris said the crops in the Griswood district, where he farms, will not give a bumper yield this year, but will be a good average crop. He says his wheat will go 20 bushels to the acre and the oats 60.

"Well, he replied, 'I don't like it quite as well as running the binder, because when one gets as old as I am stooking gets rather hard.'

"But doesn't operating the binder necessitate more cuss words?" he was asked.

And Farmer Norris, with his cheery smile, was off to finish gathering in his crop before taking his seat in the opposition benches, where he will sit when the legislature convenes again.

BREED WHITEFISH

Millions of Fry Turned Into Lake Winnipeg From Hatchery

WINNIPEG, Aug. 29.—During 1922, 145,912,000 whitefish fry were bred in the Dauphin river fish hatchery and turned into Lake Winnipeg, Wellington McCannan, superintendent of the hatchery, said today. During 1921 the number of whitefish fry turned into the lake totalled 146,750,000.

In the years 1916 and 1917 the total distribution of whitefish fry for the Dominion was 504,733,000 and the total distribution from Manitoba's four hatcheries was 250,000,000. Mr. McCannan said, while Manitoba has only one-tenth the number of whitefish hatcheries in the Dominion, the output of young fish is one-half the Dominion's total. In Ontario, 205,662,500 fish were distributed from eight hatcheries in 1920, while 201,111,250 were put into Lake Winnipeg from Manitoba's four hatcheries during the same year.

RUSSIA BUYS MEAT FROM ARGENTINA

MOSCOW, Aug. 29.—The Russian Government Grain Produce Company has purchased 2,000,000 pounds of meat in the Argentine, paying 500,000 gold rubles in cash, and the balance in Russian raw products, according to local newspapers.

OFFERS TO MARRY

Comely Young Woman Detained at Ellis Island Seeks Matrimony as Means of Release.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Offering to marry any man who would step forward for the purpose so that she would not be held up by immigration officials, Miss Rose Poch, a comely young woman, who had lived in New York ten years, arrived on the steamship Mount Clay of the United American lines, and is detained at Ellis Island.

Miss Poch, who was employed by the hotel Pennsylvania, had gone to Germany three months ago to visit relatives and friends but before her departure had taken out only her first naturalization papers.

Miss Poch made her offer of marriage after the ship arrived at quarantine and she had been apprised of her certain detention. Several young men, among them one or two newspapermen, appeared deeply interested but maintained a discreet silence.
