

MURDEROUS ATTACKS ON BRITISH SUBJECTS PEOPLE OF EGYPT

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Aug. 29. The recent attack in this city by Lieutenant-Colonel Arthur Frederick Hamilton Pigott was the sixteenth case in the series of murderous assaults upon British subjects in Egypt. It called again to mind the threat of the nationalists that an Englishman would be shot daily until the return of Said Zaghloul Pasha, the Nationalist leader who was deported by the British last December, and is the latest addition to the extended chain of anti-British political outrages.

Lieutenant-Colonel Pigott, of the Royal Army Pay Corps, was shot and gravely wounded in Kadi El Fadil Street by unknown assailants while walking to his office, was taken immediately into the house of an Egyptian doctor, Mezni, at No. 1 Kadi El Fadil Street and was given first aid, being afterwards transported to the Officers' Hospital at Abbassia where one of the three bullets which had hit him was extracted.

Hopes are entertained of his recovery, but this new crime has aroused great indignation among the European population in Egypt.

IRISH CONSTABULARY ARRIVE AT EDMONTON

Some Have Already Secured Positions in that City; Are War Veterans.

EDMONTON, Aug. 29.—Advisors of ex-members of the Royal Irish Constabulary are arriving in Edmonton. Already several of these immigrants have made applications for appointments to the city and provincial police forces and in a number of instances they have been accepted without hesitation.

Chief of Police Shute was greatly impressed with a number of these highly trained ex-officers when they approached him for posts on the Edmonton force, as there were vacancies there, the men could not be accepted.

The men who have arrived are war veterans and also in considerable service with the constabulary. One had seen 12 years service although he is now thirty years of age, while another young man of 27 had joined up when he was 18. On demobilization of the force, he had decided to come to Canada.

Under the C.P.R. colonization scheme, some hundred and sixty other members of the force are settling in Southern Alberta. It is expected that, ultimately, 5,000 these settlers will be brought this country.

CITY'S CONNECTION POLICY WAS AGAIN UNDER DISCUSSION

The recommendation of the board of works that light, telephone and water connections in future be made only to the city's property line and that the policy of building roads over railway company property be discontinued was again under discussion by the city council last night. As far as light and telephone was concerned it was decided on recommendation of the utilities committee that the application of the recommendation be dealt with from time to time as the cases arose. It was pointed out that it would not be practicable to make connections only at the property line. Regarding the building of roads over railway property, it was decided before going further to communicate with the railway company to ascertain what it intended doing in regard to the maintenance of old roads on its property and the building of new ones.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR MUNICIPALITIES MEETING

Changes in Relief Work to be Suggested—Abolition of School Boards and Police Commissions

Regarding unemployment relief work for the coming winter, the city council is to recommend at the forthcoming convention of Union of B.C. Municipalities that the federal provincial governments undertake to take the responsibility of providing relief for all returned soldiers and non-residents and that the governments assist in the proportions of one-third each in all relief work, permanent work to be allowed instead of temporary.

In regard to the convention, Ald. Montgomery brought forward a recommendation that the abolition of police commissions and school boards be passed for their duties to be taken over by the city council.

Mayor Rochester also suggested that two year instead of one-year terms for aldermen be recommended.

The Price Rupert program for the convention will come up for further discussion at next week's meeting.

1/2 cup milk
1/2 cups flour
3 teaspoons Dr. Price's Baking Powder

2 cups fresh grated coconut

Cream shortening; add sugar, beaten egg and lemon juice; mix in milk slowly; add flour, baking powder and salt which have been sifted together; add coconut. Batter should be quite stiff. Drop by small spoonfuls on greased pan. Do not smooth over but allow space for spreading. Bake in moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes.

NUT BARS
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
4 tablespoons milk
4 cups flour
3 teaspoons Dr. Price's Baking Powder

1/2 cup blanched almonds
Reserve one egg yolk for top.

Cream shortening and sugar together; add slowly beaten yolk and whites of two eggs and three tablespoon milk; sift together flour, baking powder and salt, and add, mixing well. Roll half dough at a time 1/4 inch thick on floured board; cut into bars 1 by 3 inches. Brush with yolk of remaining egg mixed with one tablespoon milk. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.
