LONDON, June 5.—Miss Beatrice Grimshaw, the novelist, has just arrived in this country after a six months' journey in New Guinea and other South Sea Islands. She has strange and ghastly stories to tell about the cannibal tribes who are still to be found in New Guinea, their ways of torturing, killing, and cooking their victims, and their belief—common to cannibals in other lands—that when they devour the flesh of any human being his virtues pass into them.

On the subject of hypnotism and sorcery, as practised by the Polynesians, Miss Grimshaw was very interesting. She told of dances she had seen that had the power of hypnotizing an entire audience, and of the absolute submission with which natives would, as if under a spell, obey the command to enter a lethal house, although they knew perfectly well that they would be killed there.

More extraordinary, however, was her description of the "Sorcerers' University," with its two years' course before a candidate passes his finals, and the inexplicable power which some sorcerers have over snakes. The sorcerers can not only handle the snakes with the impunity of an Indian snake charmer. They carry the art many steps farther, and train their writhing pets to take a dislike to certain people and then put them in places where the victims are sure to be bitten.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and second-class land to be \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted a certificate of occupancy.

Records may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and improvements of \$1000 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and evidence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mills, factories or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 60 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of a sum.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The one within, which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption records received after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.**  
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

**GRAZING.**  
Grazing Act, 1913, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
