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

Local Firm and Export of Logs.

The J. R. Morgan Company is engaged in logging at Surf Inlet and has orders for spruce and hemlock logs. In getting out these it is necessary to log at the same time a quantity of cedar. T' ore is good market for the spruce and hemlock, but the cedar

nigh-priced log and should sell at a good figure and help to make the logging remunerative.

There is a market for cedar logs for export to Japan at a price twice as high as that paid by the pulp mills, but the Provincial Government does not allow export of logs unless circumstances are exceptional. There is a commission which makes TENDERS FOR PUBLIC recommendations, and this commission is made up of Vancouver people.

If export of cedar logs from this district were allowed, the logs would be shipped from this port and would tend to bring Oriental steamers here. A lucrative business could be worked up and this port would benefit. As it is, the only logs exported are sent from Vancouver.

Vancouver is as near a pulpwood market as is Prince Rupert. The Powell River paper mill is not far away. The waters leading lows: to it are sheltered and there would be no difficulty in towing the booms there. But that would not be profitable and it would not encourage Vancouver shipping.

There is no market here at present for cedar logs. The only Marine Ironworks and Prince Ruplace they can be sold is to the pulp mill. There is a scarcity of pert Supply Co. cedar throughout the world and it seems wicked to grind up this valuable wood into pulp and paper when it could be utilized for other purposes more suitable.

In a general way the policy of the Provincial Government in Stork's Hardwark, Howe & Mcregard to the prevention of log export is one to be commended. Nulty, H. As there is no market, the next best thing would be to allow export to Japan. This would at the present time be a great advantage fromworks, Akerberg & Thomson,

to us. Possibly the Provincial Government has information that a shingle mill is to open here soon. If it has we have no more to Rupert Supply Co., J. H. Kelly say. If there is a local market for cedar, the cedar should be kept Limited Rowe's Sheet Metal here. What we want is to see Longwill, Akerberg & Thomson. Oriental shipping from Prince Rupert and a permit to allow the Rubert Marine Tronworks export of cedar logs would at the present time encourage that shipping.


Developments at Massett Inlet.
