Local Firm and Export of Logs.

The J. B. Morgan Company is engaged in logging at Surf Inlet and has orders for spruce and hemlock logs. In getting out these it is necessary to log at the same time a quantity of cedar.

There is a market for cedar logs for export to Japan at a price twice as high as that paid by the pulp mills, but the Provincial Government does not allow export of logs unless circumstances are exceptional.

If export of cedar logs from this district were allowed, the logs would be shipped from this port and would tend to bring Oriental steamers here. A lucrative business could be worked up and this port would benefit.

Vancouver is as near a pulpwood market as is Prince Rupert. The Powell River paper mill is not far away. The waters leading to it are sheltered and there would be no difficulty in towing the booms there.

There is no market here at present for cedar logs. The only place they can be sold is to the pulp mill. There is a scarcity of cedar throughout the world and it seems wicker to grind up this valuable wood into pulp and paper when it could be utilized for other purposes more suitable.

In a general way the policy of the Provincial Government in regard to the prevention of log export is one to be commended. We want to manufacture our own logs into lumber. If there were a market for cedar in this district nothing could be said, as there is no market, the next best thing would be to allow export to Japan.

Possibly the Provincial Government has information that a single mill is to open here soon. If it has we have no more to say. If there is a local market for cedar, the cedar should be kept here. If, however, log export is allowed from Vancouver and refused here under similar circumstances, then it seems as if this port was being discriminated against.

Developments at Massett Inlet.

Everyone in this district will be interested in the developments which are about to take place at the Queen Charlotte Islands. The information given by Dr. Lawson in regard to the operation of the sawmill and the coming of settlers is an indication that the Queen Charlottes are likely to be in the limelight.

Little Welshman Is Again on Top.

MUCH FISH IN YESTERDAY

Month of April Got off to Good Start With 340,000 Pounds.

BIG FISH SPECIAL TRAIN DESPatched EAST

Bearing the catches of the fishing schooners which marketed their halibut at this port yesterday morning, a special fish train of 15 cars was despatched for the east at midnight last night. The fish, bought and packed by the various concerns here, is consigned to several large cities in the Eastern States such as New York, Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia, St. Louis and St. Paul.

The month of April is off to a good start in quantity of halibut being landed, for 340,000 pounds were handled through the Fish Exchange yesterday, the first auction day in the month.
