"The companies have proved," he declared, "that they could stand up ell against war, pestilence and now economic depression. The only thing that remains to be demonstrated is as to whether or not they can stand up against prosperity. This does not seem a hard thing to do. But we must remember that it was in a period of prosperity that the seeds of depression were sown. When prosperity returns, we must see if we can devise means by which another economic crisis of this kind can be averted."

Godson Steele, Former Comptroller-General on Manitoba, Was For Years With Price Waterhouse Co.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 24:-J. Godson Steele, first comptroller-general of the province of Manitoba, news of whose death at Kansas City has been received here, was 54 years of age an da native of Dundee, Scotland. He was articled to a chartered accountancy firm in Scotland at the age of seventeen after having received his education in the Edinburgh schools and at Glasgow University. He passed his final examination as a chartered accountant of Scotland in 1902 and was admitted as a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants and Actuaries in Scotland.

In 1903, the late Mr. Steele came to America and became associated with the firm of Price Waterhouse & Co., chartered accountants, in the various branches of the firm in Canada, United States and Mexico until 1915.
