British Columbia junior-hockey champions will not be listed among those present when the national finals are played this season. The National League baseball schedule for 1922 has just been announced in New York City, as before there will be the eight cities in the circuit: Boston, Brooklyn, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis. The season will open on April 12 with Brooklyn at New York, Chicago at Cincinnati, Boston at Philadelphia and Pittsburgh at St. Louis. The first game at Brooklyn will be on April 16 with Philadelphia. The league will open at Boston, Pittsburgh and Chicago on April 20 with Philadelphia, St. Louis and Cincinnati respectively. The schedule will continue until the first week in October.

The American League will also travel over the same circuit as last year with teams representing Chicago, St. Louis, Detroit, Cleveland, Washington, Philadelphia, New York and Boston. The schedule will commence on April 12 with St. Louis at Chicago, Detroit at Cleveland, New York at Washington and Philadelphia at Boston. Openers at St. Louis, Detroit, Philadelphia and New York will be on April 20 with Chicago, Cleveland, Boston and Washington respectively. The Junior League schedule will be over about ten days in advance of the National. In both leagues there will be mid-week changes and no series will exceed five games, the most of them being three and four.
