DEFENDS ENGINEER.

Editor Daily News:

I think it is only fair to the city engineer that it should be brought to the attention of those who read Mr. Maguire's letter, that though the latter gentleman is entirely at liberty to say what he likes about the Seventh Street proposition, he is hardly entitled to criticize the opinion of a professional engineer, particularly through the press which more or less precludes that engineer from replying.

Further I would like to hear the opinion of transfer men and teamsters on several of the grades he quotes as practical for hauling heavy loads.

He also quotes the original planners of the townsite as authority. I was under the impression that these gentlemen were somewhat discredited in their conception of the layout of this city.

In fact I understand that the city was originally planned by a firm of landscape gardeners to whose plan the Development Company's engineers endeavored to conform at the sacrifice of engineering principles.

In time, the saving of a few thousand dollars in construction of the steeper grades has to be paid for hundreds of times over in haulage costs for all time to come.

The main reason (i.e. easy grade) for the existence of the G. T. P. Railway and incidentally this city, is the same reason that Mr. Maguire endeavors to show as being no reason.
