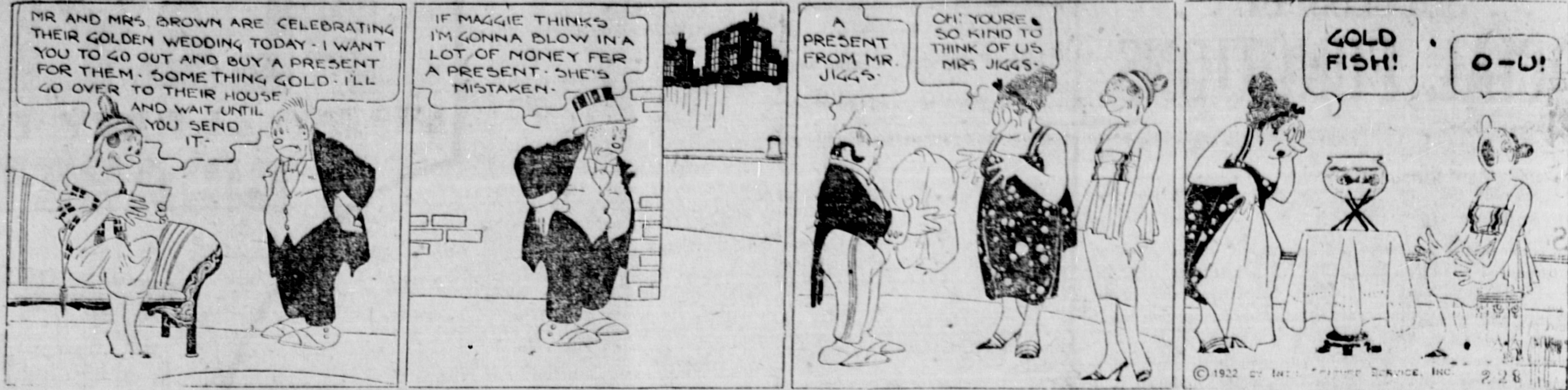

CITY COUNCIL TO RECEIVE SAME PAY AGAIN THIS YEAR

The indemnity bylaw for the year 1922 providing for \$300 pay to aldermen and \$1500 to the mayor, with a deduction of \$3 for each meeting missed by the aldermen, passed its first and second readings before the city council last night.

In connection with the bylaw, Ald. Collart moved that the aldermen forego their \$300 for the year for reasons of economy. The motion was supported by Ald. Dybhavn. After some discussion, in which Ald. Silversides, Ald. Montgomery and Mayor Rochester expressed opposition to the cut, the vote was put and Ald. Collart and Ald. Dybhavn were the only members of the board who voted for the eliminating of the aldermanic stipend.

The bylaw then passed its formal reading without further delay. The indemnities provided for this year are the same as last year.

ANOTHER FISHING SCHOONER TO FACE BLUENOSE FOR CUP

HALIFAX, Mar. 7.—Most Nova Scotians regard the Lunenburg schooner Bluenose, winner of the 1921 international fishermen's championship trophy, as the logical defender of the tankard for Canada this year. A "dark horse" is now building at Lunenburg and probably will compete in the elimination races west of Halifax next September, when the defender will be selected, but the schooner race enthusiasts of Halifax and Lunenburg pick the Bluenose as the winner of the final contest.

As for the international races, which, in accordance with the deed of gift, will be held off Gloucester this year, probably in October, there is no such certainty, though many "Bluenoses" predict another Canadian victory. Forecasters talk—and there is much of it these cold days, with the bank schooners snug at their berths for the winter or else freighting south—credits the "downhomer" with a good chance of winning but goes no further.

The exact dimensions of the Puritan are not known here, but it is generally accepted that, designed by W. Starling Burgess, she will be capable of showing a clean pair of heels to most fishing vessels and that Captain Angus Walters, the Bluenose's clever little skipper, will find the new Yankee schooner a hard nut to crack. Captain Angus, home now at Lunenburg watching the sale of the fish his vessel caught on the banks last year, is moderately optimistic but not talkative. He says he will reserve his views until the race is over.
