A letter in regard to the prospects for a small knitting mill in Prince Rupert was last night referred to its committee by the Board of Trade.

Burchill O. Oughton was last night elected a member of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade and the resignation of W. J. McCutcheon was accepted.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night it was decided to endorse a proposal of the St. Catharines Board of Trade asking for certain postoffice improvements.

A letter was read at the Board of Trade meeting last night from the public utilities committee of the city council in regard to the street lighting. It was explained that the committee had for some time had the matter under consideration and hoped before long to evolve a scheme for better light in the business section of the city.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade last night the publicity committee was instructed to prepare a leaflet in regard to Prince Rupert suitable for using in an ordinary envelope along with business letters. This will be quite small and will not cost much, yet it is expected to make it contain all the principal facts about the city.

The two ministers from the city, Hon. T. D. Pattullo and Hon. A. M. Manson, were appointed delegates to the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade at Victoria, March 29, and if any other members of the board are going to be in the south about that time they will be given credentials. This was decided at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night.

J. H. Dunlop, travelling passenger agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was a visitor in the city this morning, having arrived from the south on the Princess Beatrice last night returning on the same steamer at noon today. Mr. Dunlop has been inspecting wharves at the various ports of call for the Princess Beatrice with a view to landing facilities. He is also lining up business generally for the new service. This is his first trip north.

FUNERAL OF LATE FRED IVES WITH MILITARY HONORS

With full military honors, the funeral of the late Fred Ives, who died in the General Hospital on Thursday evening, took place this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock under the auspices of the local branch of the Great War Veterans' Association. Following the service, conducted by Rev. Canon G. A. Rix at the B. C. Undertaker's parlors, a parade followed the hearse to Fairview Cemetery where interment took place. The Great War Veterans' band took part in the ceremonies and there was quite a large following of returned soldiers and citizens generally as well as the immediate members of the family.

As the casket was lowered into the grave at the cemetery, a firing squad, comprising Sergeant S. L. Warrior, Corporals E. G. Newnam and T. Brice and Constables Stevenson, Thorndwaite and Davies, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, fired a volley and William Rance sounded the last post. The pallbearers were: Norman Short, J. D. Stevenson, Jack Flint, J. Webster, C. L. Youngman and Hugh Killen.
