FOG ALARMS KETCHIKAN

New Station to Be Erected at Entrance to Tongass Narrows.

KETCHIKAN, March 4.—W. C. Dibrell, superintendent of lighthouses for Alaska, announces that new fog stations are to be established at Guard Island and Point Retreat, the former at the western entrance to Tongass Narrows. At present there is a fog bell at Guard Island but its value is limited. A reinforced concrete building will be erected surrounded by a tower and lantern and another dwelling will be built so that there may be another lightkeeper with one always on duty.

A similar installation is contemplated for Point Retreat at the northern end of Admiralty Island about 35 miles from Juneau.

Automatic lights are to be established at Slate Island, Menard Hall Bar, Peril Strait and Sitka Sound and several lights along the Alaskan peninsula. In all the sum of \$125,000 is expected to be spent.

ALASKA WILL MAKE FISHERMEN PAY TAXES

KETCHIKAN, Mar. 4.—"This year the territory is going after the non-resident fishermen to make them pay the territorial tax," said E. L. Hunter, collector, who has been in Ketchikan working for some weeks. "This will not affect the southeast so much as it will the operations in Bering Sea. About 2500 non-resident fishermen go up there every year and five dollars from each of them will make considerable difference to the treasury. A representative of the treasurer's office will be there this year to see that the money is collected."
