DUTIES OF BRITISH ASTRONOMER ROYAL

Has to Keep Record of Big Ben and Keep Chronometers and Watches in Order.

LONDON, Mar. 9.—The functions of the Astronomer Royal, who has, it is stated, to give his approval to the new clock for the Royal Exchange, are multifarious. One of them is to keep a record of the rate of Big Ben. Twice every day the great clock at Westminster sends automatically a signal to the Royal Observatory at Greenwich. The time this signal arrives is carefully noted. It is not part of the Astronomer Royal's duty to correct Big Ben, and even if it were such a duty would be almost negligible. Big Ben is never more than a second or two wrong in the hour, and rarely that.

The Astronomer Royal also tests chronometers and watches for the Admiralty. The chronometers belonging to the Navy are stored at the Observatory. After every period of service they are examined, and, if necessary, sent to the makers for repair.

On their return to the Observatory they are tested and rated. As many are for use in hot climates, part of the test consists in putting them in ovens heated to a temperature of about 98 degrees. They are tested also in cooling chambers. After being tested the chronometer is adjusted. The change from a cold to a hot temperature should not be very marked on the instrument. If, however, very much irregularity is shown, it has again to be corrected by the maker. Before the instrument is sent out on service it must pass the Astronomer Royal's test, so that the Navy is assured of having the finest chronometers if it is possible for them to get.

AROUND WORLD BOAT ARRIVES AT SYDNEY

SYDNEY, Australia, March 9.—The American ninety-eight foot motorboat, *Spee Jacks*, has arrived here completing her first half of a trip around the world.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

MADE MILLION FROM SMELT FISHING THIS SEASON N. BRUNSWICK

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 9.—Fishermen of five counties including what is known as the North Shore of New Brunswick cleared up more than a million dollars on the smelt fishing season which is now closing.

Gloucester, Restigouche, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland counties have all benefited from the season's success, but Northumberland County with the Miramichi River as the banner fishing ground, made the biggest cleanup, estimates giving Northumberland \$600,000 of the one million which the smelt season produced.

Smelt were unusually plentiful all along the northern and eastern coasts of New Brunswick this year, and because of the unemployment situation special permission was obtained whereby the smelt season opened earlier and closed later than provided by law. The output was marketed both in Upper Canada and the United States, as well as locally and fishermen are said to have averaged about seven cents per pound for their catch. Two men are known to have sold a night's catch for \$500.
