# JOHN BUNNY'S PARTNER APPEARS WITH "CONNIE" TALMAGE IN PICTURE

Flora Finch, Pioneer Comedienne of the Silverfoot, was Part in "Lessons in Love"

Flora Finch, the first comedienne in motion pictures, formerly a partner of the late John Bunny, is to be seen with Constance Talmadge in the latter's "Associated First National" starring vehicle, "Lessons in Love" which is the attraction at the Westholme Theatre again tonight. Miss Finch, Kate Price and John Bunny were a famous trio in the early Vitagraph days.

In "Lessons in Love" Miss Finch has the role of an elderly maiden aunt of Leila Galthorpe, a capricious young heiress, portrayed by Constance Talmadge. Leila, posing as a maid in order to escape a marriage conspiracy, deceives the young man in question by telling him that the spinster is the woman whom his rich uncle has selected for him to marry. A glimpse at the angular old maid's photograph is enough to cause the young fellow to decide that he would rather marry the supposed servant than his uncle's choice, and then the complications pile up rapidly.

Flora Finch has been and educated in England. She began her stage career with Ben Greet in Great Britain, and was also in vaudeville. She made her first big success in motion pictures with John Bunny and became one of the best known characters on the screen. She has appeared under the banners of the Vitagraph, Biograph, Pathe-Thamhouser, the Flora Finch Film Company, Cape-Hani, Flag-Paramount and the Blackton. # SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.  
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.  
Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, and evidence of at least 2 years are required.  
Where pre-emptor in occupation makes improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted a temporary certificate of improvement and transfer his claim to another person.  
Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant has made improvements to value of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements for 2 years will result in forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$1000 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and evidence of at least 2 years are required.  
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may, without actual occupation, provide statutory improvements, including residence, on his claim, and Crown granted land.  
Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres may be leased to pre-emptors on title to be obtained after fulfilling local and improvement conditions.  
For greater and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be used by one person or company.  
Mill, factory or industrial sites, on unimproved land, may be purchased, provided improvements include a system of drainage.  
New roads may be purchased, including existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road thereon. Estate of unimproved land, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.  
**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT**  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The one within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for the grant of a free grant, is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the war. This privilege is also made retrospective.  
No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by holders on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1915. Fees are required for five years.  
Provision for return of purchase accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, "see" or taxes on sold-out pre-emptions.  
Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces or descendants acquired direct or indirect result from enlistment to March 31, 1920.  
**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS**  
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1922.  
**GRAZING**  
Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

The application of City Clerk E. A. Woods for an increase in salary from \$175 to \$225 was again considered by the city council last night and after some discussion was rejected. Ald. Dybbavn stated that the Finance Committee was not prepared to recommend the increase and moved that the application be received and filed. This was seconded by Ald. Montgomery who said that he was opposed to increases at the present time as a matter of principle. Neither Ald. Dybbavn or Ald. Montgomery had anything but good to say of the services of the city clerk but the tendency now was to decrease rather than advance salaries.  
Ald. Perry said that in view of the nature of the clerk's work, the responsibility and his value to the city, he thought the salary was inadequate and moved an amendment that an increase to \$200 be made. This was seconded by Ald. McLeod. On the amendment being put Ald. Perry and Ald. McLeod were the only members of the council to vote for it. The motion to receive and file the application then passed.  
In speaking to his application Mr. Woods said that he wanted a definite answer although he was not prepared to give the reason at this time.  
Mr. Woods will be leaving next week for holidays in the south.
