## PREMIER KING CONGRATULATED

Trades and Labor Council Appreciation at Appointment of Moore to Railway Board

A meeting of the Trades and Labor Council was held last night in the Carpenters' Hall, S. D. Macdonald being in the chair. There was a good attendance.

The Calgary Trades and Labor Council are conducting a campaign against the four western provinces entering into a ten year agreement with Gage of Toronto for the printing of school books. The opposition is based on the ten year contract, the fact of the printing being done in the east and the subject matter of the text books not being suitable. The stand of the Calgary Council was endorsed by the meeting.

It was recommended that ten year bonds be issued in connection with the raising of money for the Nurses' Home.

A telegram was sent to Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress, congratulating him upon his being elected to the new railway board. A telegram was also sent to the Hon. Mackenzie King in which appreciation of his putting into practical effect what he has recommended in theory in his book entitled "Humanity and Industry," was expressed.

A letter of congratulation was sent to F. G. Dawson congratulating him upon his recent appointment as member of the new railway board.

A mass meeting of labor, to which all labor organizations in the city have been invited, will be held next Tuesday night in the Carpenters' Hall for the purpose of organization and discussion of civic politics.

## SILVER CREEK IS SCENE OF BEAR KILLING

## ALICE ARM

Miss Nettie Hogburg has arrived home from holidays in Prince Rupert.

Dr. R. Whelan and Chas. MacLachlan of Anxox, spent a few days hunting around town last week. They bagged 16 ducks and 8 grouse.

The Ghephen has taken out a shipment of high grade ore from the Spranza mine. The ore was shipped to the Trail smelter.

James Nick arrived on Thursday last from Prince Rupert, and has been busy renewing acquaintances. He spent the summer in the Naas Valley.

Extensive logging operations will in all probability shortly be carried on at Alice Arm. J. E. Taylor, stated that it is the intention of Trethewey Bros. to log their holdings on the Kitsault flats. Two other timber limits have been acquired by the Trethewey Bros. from the Granby Co. These limits are situated on the waterfront, one being located near town and the other at the mouth of the Hlanze river, and both of these limits will also be logged. Mr. Taylor stated that Trethewey Bros. would be in Alice Arm in two or three weeks, and then it would be definitely settled whether the building of camps would be commenced this year, or wait until spring. Whatever happened, logging operations would start next spring as soon as the snow was off the ground.

## AEROPLANE RETURNS FROM STEWART TRIP

With Local Party Aboard Hazelton Completes 250 Mile Journey in Excellent Time

The aeroplane Hazelton arrived in port from Stewart at 5.30 p.m. yesterday. With a local party aboard the Hazelton left the harbor yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, arriving in Stewart soon after twelve noon.

A perfect landing was made at Stewart and, according to Major Thompson the pilot, very few people knew that the plane was there.

After practically a four hour stay in Stewart the party embarked at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon and were back in Prince Rupert at 5.30 thereby completing a round trip of 250 miles in three hours actual flying. The trip was highly successful from every angle and the wonderfully clear weather which prevailed for the flight gave the passengers an excellent opportunity for observation. It is probable that the Hazelton will leave this afternoon for her base.
