

## BRINGING UP FATHER



## Archbishop Visits Upper Stikine and Tells of the Wonders of the Country

After having baptized the chief of the Tahltan Indians, confirmed a number of natives, and travelled for days among the most wonderful scenery in the world, Archbishop DuVernet is home again this week from a visit to the upper Stikine country. There the Indians go to church twice every day when they are at home. At Telegraph Creek a parsonage is just being completed and a new church is to be commenced soon. Hunters are going into the country for big game and incidentally they see lava beds and basaltic rocks which are intensely interesting to the geologist.

### To Telegraph Creek

The Upper Stikine country is a vast and interesting region in the northern interior of British Columbia. It can be easily reached in the summer time by taking a gas boat from Wrangall, Alaska, and proceeding up the Stikine River. The journey to Telegraph Creek, which is a government and a Hudson's Bay Company post 150 miles up this river, occupies about two days and a half when conditions are favorable and the water is not too high or too low.

About twenty miles up the river the boundary line is crossed, and the Canadian Customs officer takes a careful record of every one entering the interior by this route. This is important as lonely prospectors might easily be lost in the wilds.

### Immense Glaciers

It is doubtful if any navigable river in the world affords grander scenery. Both banks are lined with towering mountains varying in rugged outline. There are at least a dozen large glaciers, and many more smaller ones. Popoff glacier is so called because the ice comes to the edge of a precipice and then pops off. The Big Glacier is six miles wide where it spreads out like a fan on the north bank of the river after having slowly descended fifty miles between mountain peaks.

Above the Big Canyon the scenery and the climate change. The country becomes a little more open. The river is less serpentine as the water has evidently cut its way more easily through the basaltic rocks. Sculptured columns stand prominently out worthy of a stately temple. Here and there lava beds may be seen testifying to mighty volcanic action. As yet few tourists take this scenic trip. Put it is known to many big game hunters who come from different parts of the world to shoot bear and moose and mountain sheep in the Upper Stikine country.

On the same boat in which Archbishop Du Vernet went up the river in the middle of August were no less than three hunting parties, including Dr. Arbuthnot, of Pittsburgh, Pa., Dr. Burthe, New Orleans, La., and Lord Claude Hamilton of England.
