HON. T. D. PATTULLO TO REPRESENT B.C. REGARDS STEEL WORKS

BUILDING GUILDS TO UNDERTAKE CONTRACTS

Member of Trades and Labor Executive Addresses Carpenters.

A. M. Davis of Victoria, who is a member of the Executive of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress is in the city on his way home from the annual convention which was held in Montreal this year.

From a Union standpoint while there was an undoubted tendency to disband their organizations and lower wages he pointed out that men like Mr. King of Hodgson & King, Vancouver, president of Building Contractors' Association had stated at a mass meeting of Carpenters in Vancouver that the time had not yet arrived to justify a reduction of wages.

Mr. Davis predicted that wage disputes would soon be settled by the union members forming building guilds and carrying out contracts themselves.

FOLLETTE VICTORY IMPORTANT EVENT

Is Opposed to Old Guard of Republican Party.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(By Canadian Press)—The fact that Senator Robert M. La Follette has been renominated for the senatorship in Wisconsin by a record-breaking majority for primary contests in his state is commanding more than passing notice in Washington.

As interpreted here, the great majority of Senator La Follette, though there were a number of factors in it, is due primarily to the same causes which have resulted in a number of states in the defeat of the Republican old guard.

Some effort is made to interpret the La Follette victory as due to the fact the voters supported him. Some attribute it to the fact he was not friendly to the war policy and had the support of German-Americans in the state to a large extent.

Senator La Follette, in season and out has fought against high railroad rates under the existing Cummins-Esch transportation act. He has fought the high rates of the new tariff measure, now about to be enacted.

In other words, Senator La Follette has taken a position which is squarely opposed to the position of the Old Guard republican leaders in Congress, in the executive departments, and elsewhere.

What has really happened, in other words, is that another enormous vote has been rolled up by the progressive elements in the republican party as against the Old Guard elements.

To sugar add boiling water very slowly to make a smooth paste; add vanilla, melted chocolate and orange peel. Spread between layers and on top of cake.
