Co-Operate With Terrace And All Other Points.

Co-operation between all points in Northern British Columbia should be the rule. Rev. Dr. Grant, when addressing the Rotary Club, drew attention to the need of closer co-operation between this city and Terrace. What he says is doubtless correct. There is not as close co-operation as might be. Yet Terrace people are dependent for some of their prosperity on Prince Rupert and Prince Rupert depends on Terrace and other neighboring places for its prosperity. There is no rivalry but there should be cooperation.

When Prince Rupert people go to Terrace to spend their holidays, they spend some money there and this is sometimes enough to make the difference between profit and loss on the year's operations of a merchant. If facilities were offered, more Prince Rupert people would summer at Terrace. The custom of spending a few weeks out of town is growing. Almost everyone counts on taking a holiday in the summer. Terrace offers a complete change for Prince Rupert people and there is plenty of fruit there, especially berries, on a normal season. Those things are an attraction. As the population of this city increases more people will visit Terrace each year to the benefit of both places.

Provide Facilities For Visitors .

Prince Rupert is just beginning to awaken to the fact that the tourist business means a good deal to her. So far nothing particular has been done to cater to the business. Local taxil firms have not even put on a sight seeing car to accommodate them. Visitors like to ride all together in a big car with someone along to point out the places of interest. For this service they are usually glad to pay a dollar each and a load in a sight seeing car at a dollar a head pays well. If local firms will not put on such a car it will be worth the Board of Trade considering whether they will form a small company to operate such a car at this point. If we are to get tourists here we must show them the cit and provide other facilities for them.
