Famous Irishman Dies Dublin Today NO FIGHTING CORK BUT THE BUILDINGS OF CITY ARE BURNING

Attack by Irish Irregulars on Dublin Post Office is Void of Results; Cork Taken

LONDON, Aug. 12 .- Communication with Dublin was lost st evening at eleven oclock after a brief telephone message said he post office there had been captured by rebel forces and that he adjoining building was afire.

Word has been received here that national troops have enered Cork and taken fifty prisoners. Seven of the national roops were killed and many wounded. Much of the city is in ames and the firemen are powerless to cope with the fires which already have done ten million dollars worth of damage.

Arthur Griffiths Dies Today In Dublin After Operation

BELFAST, Aug. 12 .- Arthur Griffith, president of Dail Eireann, died in Dublin today of influenza, it is learned here. Death ocurred at 9:45 at St. Vincent's Hospital, Dublin. He entered the hospital ten days ago for an operation for tonsilitis. He was recovering and apparently regaining his normal strength during the last few days. He had been able to leave the hospital daily for his official duties, returning to the institution at night.

This morning Mr. Griffiths ate a hearty breakfast and was going upstairs when he suddenly collapsed. The doctor declared he had been suffering from cere-
