

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DELEGATION TO OTTAWA**PRINCE RUPERT WINS OVER WANDERERS BY BIG MARGIN AT SOLO****OFFER DEMPSEY \$300,000 FOR A RETURN BOUT**

Recommendations From Outside Points of District Incorporated in the Memorial.

At the meeting of the council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon it was decided to ask for a daily mail service from eastern points as well as the daily train.

Letters of endorsement of the requests of the local board which are to be carried to Ottawa by the local member and also by a delegation of the board, were received from Terrace, Usk, Port Clements, Stewart and Smithers, and several recommendations made by them were incorporated in the memorial to the government.

The finance committee will meet the committee of the city council in connection with the delegation on Saturday morning and will also meet the council on Monday evening.

The opinion was freely expressed that the delegation should leave almost immediately in order to get to the capital before the estimates for the year were made up.

London Sportsmen Want Dempsey—Carpentier Bout in London Next Summer.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Jack Kearns says a syndicate of London sportsmen have offered Dempsey a purse equal to that of Jersey City for the return match with Carpenter. The sum suggested is \$300,000, the fight to take place in London in July next.

Sport Chat

So Says Jack Kearns, Manager Dempsey—Jack Is Anxious to Defend Title.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Jack Kearns, world's heavyweight boxing champion, is anxious to defend his title against any recognized rival and is not particular as to where the scene of battle may be, according to Jack Kearns, his manager. "The big idea," says Kearns, "is to get hot. Harry Wills, Bill Brennan, Bob Roper and Tommy Gibbons or any that seek it can have a go at Jack."

A match with Wills is most talked of but promoters do not seem to be interested in it.

BILLIARD STANDINGS

William Brown, president of the St. Andrew's Society, George Johnston, president of the Sons of Canada, and Frank Salter, president of the Sons of England, touched on sport matters in their speeches at the Burns banquet on Wednesday. All three concurred in the opinion that it was sport, and especially football, that had in the past kept up the binding ties that exist between the three national societies. They were quite correct when they said that the friendly competition in the games of late years had fostered a sense of fraternity among the societies. It is to be hoped that the good feelings between them will continue to grow and that the keen competitions which will likely take place in the future, like in the past, will only tend to cement the amicable relations which should exist between the organizations, representing the different nations of the British Empire.

Mr. Johnston observed that the Sons of Canada had last year relegated to the cellar position the Gallies who, in the early days, had practically taught the Sons the soccer game. All will join in giving the Scots credit for having established the national game in this city with such success but a word might also be put in for the Sons of England who were not much behind them and afforded them their first competitions in Prince Rupert. Mr. Brown said it was true that the Scots had been beaten but it was also true that they had been beaten before and had come back. The soccer season may be quite a long way off yet but everyone hopes, just the same, that when the season of 1922 starts the Gallies will have a formidable aggregation which shall make the champion Sons look to their laurels. The same may also be hoped for all the other clubs which participate in the sport so that a record season of interest and close play may result.
