## INCREASE IN HERD OF SEALS

United States Business in Furs Is a Profitable One—Report For Year.

### COMMISSION SUGGESTED

JUNEAU, Jan. 27.—Gross proceeds amounting to \$796,103 were received by the Federal government from the fur industry on Pribilof Islands during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, according to the annual report of Dr. Hugh M. Smith, Commissioner of Fisheries. Net proceeds from the islands were \$423,400.29.

Of the latter amount there was accruing from seal skins \$312,701.29 and from fox pelts, \$86,699. However, there was deposited in the U. S. Treasury as net proceeds of sales of sealskins during 1921, the sum of \$99,983.51 in addition to which Great Britain and Japan received \$31,825.35 as their shares under the sealing convention of 1911.

"Sealskins secured in 1920 numbered 26,648, practically all from animals three or four years old. The number taken in 1921 through regular killing season that ended on August 5 was 22,516, chiefly from seals three years old. The census of the seal herd in 1920 indicated 552,718 seals of all ages as of August 19, of which 167,527 were breeding females and the same number of newborn young. In 1921 census showed the existence of 587,820 seals of all ages, of which 176,655 were breeding females with a like number of young. The aggregate strength of the herd according to these figures did not include the seals killed in each of the years named.

And further application has been made for registration of title to the above-mentioned lands, in the name of Hubert O. Crew, and whereas on investigating the title it appears that prior to the 13th day of October, 1921, the lands so named were sold for overdue taxes, you were the assessed owner thereof, or otherwise as stated below: Further, to petition to register the title to the effect, registration in pursuance of such application and issue a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the said lands in the name of Hubert O. ## 423000 POUNDS HALIBUT HERE

**BIGGEST DAY OF YEAR SO FAR AT FISH EXCHANGE—PRICES LOW.**

With 423,000 pounds of halibut offering for sale at the Fish Exchange this morning, the waterfront is a busy place today. It is so far the biggest list for a single day this year, and the large number of arrivals at one time is accounted for by the weather conditions which caused all boats to be fishing on the banks at one time. With the settling of the weather and more steady fishing conditions, the arrivals will spread out better than they are doing at the present time. The price paid was low, no boats getting over 8¢ for first-class fish. Sixty-two thousands pounds has already left for Seattle and more may go on account of the local market conditions.

Texas, 19,000 pounds, and Fisher, 4000 pounds, sold to the Pacific Fisheries at 8¢ and 4¢.

Arcade, 6000 pounds; Johanna, 10,000 pounds; Laura and Margaret, 8000 pounds, sold to the Pacific Fisheries at 7.2¢ and 4¢.

Corona, 20,000 pounds, and Sampson, 4000 pounds, sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 7.2¢ and 4¢.

Theima II, 22,000 pounds, sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 8¢ and 4¢.

Oonah, 16,000 pounds; Imperial, 8000 pounds; Fairway, 6000 pounds, and Pelican, 14,000 pounds, sold to the Royal Fish Co. at 8¢ and 4¢.

Crescent, 10,000 pounds; Aurora, 12,000; Bryant, 8000; Norland, 15,000; National, 12,000; Emblem, 4000; Lincoln, 6000; Katahdin, 10,000; Wave, 6000; Chancellor, 7000, and Discovery, 5000, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 7¢ and 4¢.

W. T., 7,000; Tramp, 9,000 and Imperieuse 8000 pounds sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company at 7.7¢ and 4¢.

Omanay, 47,000 and Panama, 58,000 pounds, offered 6¢ and 4¢ by Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. but not yet accepted.


