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DRUG TRAFFIC IS DISCUSSED

Trades and Labor Council Will Ask Amendment of Criminal Law in This Regard.

WANTS DAYLIGHT SAVING

Reduction of Civic Wages Discussed at Length and Opposition is Recorded.

At a well attended meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held last night steps were taken to secure the co-operation of other organizations in an effort to amend customs regulations so that the difficulty of "poppy products" entering Canada will be increased and to amend the criminal laws so as to provide for the deportation of aliens convicted of complicity in the drug evil, and jail sentences for those not deportable. The addict should be regarded as a sick man and as such receive medical attention.

Daylight saving was enthusiastically endorsed.

The proposed reduction of wages paid to civic employees was discussed at some length. The secretary was instructed to communicate with the city council, advising against such action and detailing reasons for such objection.

The construction of buildings for white men with Oriental labor was condemned as being opposed to the best interests of the citizens in general and organized labor in particular.

Considerable routine business was disposed of and it was decided to hold a mass meeting of union members next Sunday afternoon.

INFLUENZA SHOWS SIGNS OF ABATING IN TOWN OF ANYOX

ANYOX, Feb. 28.—The influenza epidemic in Anyox is now somewhat abating. It has laid its finger upon quite a large section of the town, but fortunately has not claimed any victims, thanks to the care and attention of the doctors, nursing staff and Polytechnic first aid class, whose services were requisitioned as the claims for attention increased. Student Joe McGuire was placed in charge of the first aid work at the smelter during the sickness of First Aid Attendant Sayers, and Student Fred Graham is doing duty at the mine owing to the illness of Dr. Patterson. H. J. Hardy, the first aid instructor, has been kept generally busy among the sick doing yeoman service in relieving the strain thrown upon Dr. Whelan.

WOULD TRADE WITH THE UNITED STATES

Man Who Defeated Hon. Arthur Meighen Opposed to Fiscal Barrier.

TORONTO, March 1.—"Something that impressed me on the way down from the west was the natural physical barrier that exists between eastern and western Canada," stated Harry Lead- er, the man who defeated Hon. Arthur Meighen at Portage La Prairie, who is here. He continued:

"It seems to me that the barrier between the East and the West means that we should trade more with the United States in natural products. If we had reciprocal relations, it would be a

good thing. An Alberta farmer shipped five car loads of cattle to Pennsylvania. He netted \$2,000 on the load. The man who bought them paid \$7,000. There was \$5,000 out of that for transportation charges, duty, etc. We want a market at our own doors.

"A home market to Canada is a good thing, but when you consider that we raise sufficient cereals for 50,000,000 people, the home market does not count for much with us. What is more natural that that we should want to trade with our neighbors to the south?"

COMOX AVENUE HOUSE BURNED

Spectacular Blaze Early This Morning—Started from Overheated Heater

The large two storey dwelling house at 939 Comox Avenue was completely destroyed by a fire which started at 7:30 this morning and was not out until after 9 o'clock. The place was owned by Matt Videck and there is understood to be a small amount of insurance. It was occupied by L. B. Hamilton who was living there himself. An overheated heater is believed to have been the cause.

Mr. Hamilton reported that he had left the place as usual about 7:10 to go to work. On account of the house being damp due to burst water pipes he had been leaving the heater in the hall going and had done so this morning. At 7:30 he heard the place was burning but when he returned the house was in flames and the fire department was on the job. Nothing was saved from the blaze, which was a spectacular one and could be seen from distant parts of the city.

The fire department had difficulty in getting water to the scene and it took some time to lay the string of hose from the nearest hydrant at the east end of Comox Avenue to the house which was two blocks distant. There was a big crowd of excited spectators.

The house adjoining is occupied by Miss Blanche Harte and its safety was threatened owing to its proximity to the blaze. The fire department, however, averted the danger. Miss Harte appreciated the efforts of the firemen in the unusual difficulties of the situation to the extent of sending the sum of \$35 to the fire hall in recognition of their hard work.

A new game of skill is being manufactured in Prince Rupert, by H. H. Hemmings, 823 Third Avenue, the originator of the idea. The basis of the game is the old fashioned skittle alley. The new switchback skittle board is an entirely new innovation in table games, and makes a fine piece of furniture. The board, which measures 15 inches wide by three feet three inches long, is made of polished oak, and the skittles, of which there are nine, are placed on a baize green cloth pitch, the skittle ball being operated on the right hand side of the pitch by a trigger. The trigger upon being pressed and released starts the ball rolling down an elevated grooved switchback, the same trigger also regulating a moving guiding chute, which the operator or player must point at the skittles while the ball is in action on the switchback. The object of the player is to knock down the nine skittle balls in three tries, and it takes considerable skill and
