### MUCH DISCUSSION ON CIVIC SALARIES AND POSSIBLE CHANGES

The proposed cut in civic wages and salaries was the subject of general conversation last evening. Views expressed were conflicting. There were self-proclaimed authorities who declared that what was needed was not a cut in salaries but the insistence of more work and more regular hours from the employees with the dropping of much of the dead wood of which they saw a good deal.

There were those who supported the cut and many who opposed it. In some places where people meet the arguments waxed hot and loud. On the whole the consensus of opinion seemed to favor a general revision of salaries rather than a straight ten per cent cut.

The opinion was expressed very generally that some of the aldermen, all of whom were said to have supported the cut in committee, had not the courage of their convictions when it came to speaking in public.

### FORMER BOILERMAKER DIED AT HOSPITAL

The death occurred at the General Hospital this morning of Alexander Halerow, aged 56 and a native of Leith, Scotland. Deceased had been a boilermaker at the local shipyard and had resided at the corner of Seventh Avenue and McBride Street. He was married but his family does not live here.
