NEW YORK, March 20 .- Wrangell Island, one of the most important islands in the Arctic regions, has been claimed for Great Britain by a party of three Americans, a Canadian and four Eskimos. This became known today through Vilhjalmar Stefansson, the organizer of the expedition, who said that the British flag had been planted on Wrangell Island since September 1 last.
