BRINGING UP FATHER



TRIAL TOOK PLACE BEFORE MAGISTRATE DURING EARLY HOURS

One of Guests in City Arrested by Men in Blue and haled Before Court.

While most of the people of Prince Rupert were sleeping this morning the mills of justice were grinding, court was in session, and a visitor to the city was tried for a serious offense but happily was acquitted.

Last night there was a banquet and after the banquet there was what the churches would call an "after meeting." After the after meeting there was another little session and still the boys on the palatial steamer Princess Charlotte did not feel that they had settled all the problems of life. They were anxious to complete the day.

There was a member of the party, who, it was suspected, had been committing the awful crime of "taking a drink," it had been carefully shadowed by the ship police and at an hour when all others were sleeping, they sent special officers in blue to arrest the criminal and bring him before the court.

Is Arraigned.

On the magistrate taking the bench and the suspected criminal being arraigned, a dispute arose as to whether the liquid he was sworn to have taken was really the rank poison it was stated to be. To make sure, the bottle was passed around, and after it had made the rounds several times it was solemnly declared that the contents were simply water.

Sentence was given and the prisoner, in view of the heinousness of the offense of providing water when it should have been something stronger, was obliged to solemnly repeat: "For what we have received may the Lord make us truly thankful."

The handcuffs were then locked away, the court adjourned, and after another bottle of water had been passed around the spectators withdrew.
