director and teachers and provide such equipment as it was necessary to purchase.

Training Desirable.

In conclusion the Anoyx director says:

"Should this project receive the public support that it justly deserves it would be necessary that business men in all walks of life, should recognize the responsibility that the future devolves upon them. We cannot hope to have experienced workmen men who can be trusted to carry out essentially technical work to a successful conclusion unless we give them every opportunity and help, which is reasonably ours to give. There are very few scientific colleges or universities that can afford the expense of installing all the machinery and equipment that is necessary for good technical training. We here in the North, on the other hand, cannot hope to find the money for the erection of such a school, let alone the equipping of the same. Unless our business men are prepared to come forward with assistance, many hundreds of men and women are going to be robbed of the opportunity of a technical training which they justly deserve. I believe that our business men are broad minded enough to realize this difficulty and are sufficiently shrewd to appreciate the advantage that such a training would be in the furtherance of their own business, that they would offer the use of their plants and equipment at convenient times to those who wished to learn and climb life's ladder of success. We want trained men and women and I see no other way to train our unskilled labor than in the manner here set forth."

Supply Deficiency.

"It was stated at the outset that the apprenticeship system had to a large degree fallen down the reasons were given why this is so. It is for technical schools and institutions of the type that I advocate to supply the deficiency. We want to take the man who is apprenticed as a machinist, for instance, and teach him the subjects upon which his success as a machinist is to be built. We want to take him through a course, spread over a certain number of years, and teach him those exercises in mechanics with which he does not come in contact in his daily work. But that is not the most important item in the education which we would wish to offer him. We want to educate him generally, all around the work he has elected to follow; to give him a knowledge of drafting; of mathematics; chemistry, of applied mechanics, of commercial letter writing and composition and of commercial geography so that he may the better be enabled to equip himself as a true craftsman, in order that he may be a credit to his employer, to the Union to which he belongs and the country in which he lives.

"The same remarks apply to all branches of technical and commercial education whether for men or women. Supplement the shop work with study which is going to increase the speed and efficiency of the individual. "From the institute, after satisfying his instructor and passing examinations in his subjects he will receive certificates and class credits and when he has completed the course in all the co-related subjects, he will receive a diploma.

Obtain Recognition.

"It is then up to the public to prove whether the hours spent in

burning the midnight oil will be appreciated and recognized. Similar diplomas are recognized in other places by both employers and unions, and apprenticeships are shortened for those who can produce them. It would be the Director's duty to obtain the same recognition for students of the institute.

"And surely it would be to the interests of public progress and commercial prosperity for the citizens to get behind and help along such students who have used their time to good advantage."

There is no reason why Prince Rupert, in the years to come, should not be the home of a great technical, commercial and industrial institute, worthy of the Province, a credit to the city and at a low overhead expenditure."
